Cambridge, England, from 1906-1931 and has held the chair of philosophy at the Catholic University of America since 1929. He preaches the Lenten Sermons each year in St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City and he gives annually a radio series over the N.B.C. Network.

#### Catholic Hour Speaker

Monsignor Sheen is recognized as the most popular of American preachers who has visited England. He was the first American to win the Cardinal Mercier prize for international philosophy and he was the first preacher on the Catholic Hour series over the National hookup and he has appeared on the program each year since its inauguration. He has lectured in the halls of such secular universities as Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois and California and has also appeared at Cornell University in Ithaca under the auspices of the Newman Club.

The Monsignor, despite his extraordinary training and his world reputation as a thinker and writer of philosophical works is best known to Americans as a preacher of sermons for persons of average intellect and education and as a writer of books for ordinary people.

Auburnians are fortunate that Monsignor Sheen is coming to Auburn to address them this evening on "The Perils of Our Times"; more fortunate than they know or will ever realize for he has been, is, and always will be fighting for a nobler cause than we know, for a nobler cause than we deserve.

#### FR. TOBIN IN NAVY

Rev. William D. Tobin, St. Mary's former assistant, has joined the Navy of Uncle Sara as a chaplain. Father Tobin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Tobin of Elmira. He was educated in St. Mary's School in Elmira and attended Niagara University. He pursued his studies for the priesthood at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, and was ordained on June 9, 1934 by Archbishop Mooney, who was then Bishop of Rochester. Father Tobin was an assistant at St. Thomas Church, Irondequoit, and St. Anthony's Church in Rochester before he was appointed as an assistant to Dr. Cowen in 1936. Father Tobin was also a student of Dr. Cowen's when he was a member of the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Father Tobin was active in all St. Mary's affairs while he was assistant here. He was moderator of the Holy Name Society, had charge of the Boy Scouts and taught religion in the school in addition to his regular parochial duties. During the four years he spent in Auburn he made many friends because of his untiring devotion to the parishioners of St. Mary's. In 1940 he was transferred to Our Lady of Perpetual Holy Church in Rochester and last June went to St. Patrick's in Corning.

Father Tobin has reported to the Chaplain's School in Virginia and upon completion of his course of study will be assigned to active duty. Father Tobin has the best wishes of his Auburn friends in his new work as chaplain in the Navy.

#### FEAST OF PENTECOST

Sunday, June 13th, is the Feast of Pentecost, the day on which the Holy Ghost descended upon the Apostles. It recalls "the first Novena commended by Christ Himself from the Ascension to Pentecost in preparation for the coming of the Holy Ghost, Who was to give birth to the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ, with Mother Mary present." Pentecost also marks the fulfillment of the last promise made by Jesus Christ Who said before his Ascension into Heaven "I will not leave you orphans. I will send you from the Father, the Paraclete, the Spirit of Consolation."

Ten days had passed since the Ascension, the Apostles shut up in the upper chamber with the blessed Virgin, who had wished to remain with them, had passed that time in prayer and pious retirement. Suddenly a noise is heard from heaven, like that of a high wind; it approaches; it fills the whole house in which the Apostles are assembled. There appeared then a shining light, which shaping itself into tongues of fire, rested on the head of each of the Apostles, and all were filled with the Holy Ghost. At the same time, they received the gift of languages, that is to say, by a miracle of the divine Spirit, they know all at once how to speak the different languages of all the nations to whom they were to go and preach the Gospel.

The gifts which the Holy Ghost bestowed on the apostles on the Feast of Pentecost are: Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety and the Fear of the Lord.

We receive the gifts of the Holy Ghost in the Sacrament of Confirmation. We do not see the tongues of fire resting on our heads, but we receive the spiritual graces of which this miracle was the sign. Receiving the Holy Ghost means to have our minds filled with the Spirit of God, who being a Spirit of Truth, of Holiness and of Strength should make us more pious and more steadfast Christians.

So on Sunday, June 13th—the Feast of Pentecost, we can recall the first Pentecost Sunday and say with the Church: "Come, O Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of Thy faithful and kindle in them the fire of Thy love."
