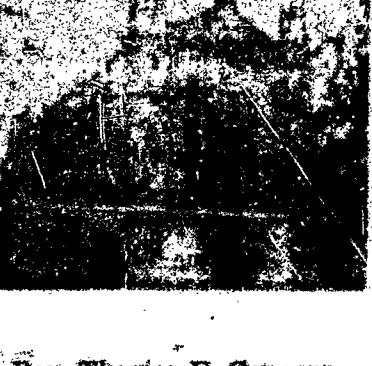

**Pulpit Announcements
Of Condemned Films**

NEW ORLEANS.—Pulpit announcements will be made in all churches of the Archdiocese of New Orleans whenever a motion picture, which has been placed on the condemned list of the Legion of Decency, is shown in the city. It has been announced here.

The Rev. Vernon J. Almon, Archdiocesan Director of the Legion of Decency, in a letter to all pastors, quoted the Most Rev. Joseph E. Rummel, Archbishop of New Orleans, as stating:

"I authorize you to forward to the pastor of the city regular announcements whenever there appears a film which is on the condemned list of the Legion of Decency. This announcement should be incorporated in the regular announcements of the parish church on the following Sunday, indicating that it is issued by the Archdiocesan Office of the Legion of Decency and that Catholics should be guided thereby as a practical expression of their pledge taken on the Sunday following the Feast of the Immaculate Conception."

OPA Briefs

Rochester Office of Price Administration has set forth on a two-fold plan to enlist the support of both the average day-to-day motorist as well as the Share The Ride war worker, in order to make available more gasoline for farm production and transportation "needs." Plan includes (1) appeal to war workers to try to save one gallon of gasoline every week. In the Rochester defense area this would mean a total saving per week of nearly 20,000 gallons. (2) urge all motorists "to pick up your neighbor" enroute to work or shopping; fill up your car and get in the habit of saying "going my way, hop in."

Consumers in this district will begin to pay three to six cents less for meals on June 21, date on which rollback on prices will begin. Price cuts on pork are scheduled for July 5. Washington is now completing a new price program reducing the prices of fresh vegetables.

New "TT" gasoline coupons for trucks, taxis and buses will be put into effect in this area on July 25. This has been done to thwart black market operations and in

Three sets of ceilings have been established on the sale of new ice boxes. (1) sales by ice companies and retail outlets controlled by ice companies range from 24.75 to 27.00 delivered. Sale of farm butter now falls in the same price category established for creamery butter. Present price ceilings are expected to drop several cents per pound soon. —You can now order coffee by mail without sending along your whole ration book. Just enclose stamp No. 24 for each pound you desire with your order.
