Missioner in Africa Thanks Our Children For Chapel Donation

Report on the progress made in the construction of the Chapel to Our Lady, Queen of Peace, in the name of the children of the diocese of Rochester, arrived in the latest mail from Africa.

Rev. C. W. Van Graven, pastor of the Church, writes: "My previous article of Dec. 22 ought to be in your hands by now. That date was a very sensational one indeed. I had to clear my spectacles twice before I was able to realize the contents of your letter. I asked myself whether it is true that within a short time \$6,433, that is over three thousand dollars, are going to be thrown into my empty safe. For more than a year I placed St. Jude and the Little Flower, Teresa on top of my care, they took charge of the key and they do their work well. Will send photos.

"Of course I agree with the provisions the Church will be completed in the name of the boys and girls of the Catholic Schools of the Diocese of Rochester, N. Y. The Church will be dedicated and named Our Lady, Queen of Peace. I shall forward several pictures of the new church to Rochester. "Last Christmas, we said Mass in our new church. An ordinary table was our altar, no tabernacle, no walls not plastered, no floor, no Communion rails, but we were happy that we were able to say Mass inside.

"You have no idea how happy I am and how grateful to you and the children of your diocese. I wish I could see them, speak to them by way of loudspeaker or wireless. I would tell them that hundreds of my black boys and girls loved down and pray to our Lord for their young white benefactors, who help them to love Jesus in a decent Church. "I pray God to bless you and the children. The Brother is going to build a most decent altar and a slab near the tabernacle will tell every priest who says Mass that the great benefactors are the Rochester children."

'Learn To Swim' Campaign Opens June 21 At CYA

During the week of June 21-25, 1943, the Columbus Youth Association is sponsoring a "Learn to Swim Campaign" for boys and girls in the fifth grade and up who cannot swim.

Lithuanian Bishops Protest Nazi Religious Persecution

LONDON—A joint protest has been issued by the Lithuanian Bishops to the commander of German authorities of occupation in Lithuania in which they denounce the use of Church property for military purposes and demand the restoration of a free Church, its activities and objects of religious worship, according to a report received here by EAP, Polish Catholic Press Agency.

The protest stated, according to the report, that the German authorities are not keeping their promises and deliberately are violating the natural rights of the people.

Health-Building Aid To Feature Diocesan Camp's Program

Camp Stella Maria, diocesan camp on eastern Conesus Lake, will open June 27 as a "summer camp in war time." Just as many of the changes demanded in every day life these days have proved healthful advantages, such as more walking, greater home life, simpler foods and less waste, so too it seems that the changes in camp program necessitated by war time will prove both beneficial and enjoyable to the campers.

Began last year as an experiment in utility, the farm program at Camp Stella Maria this year has been expanded to meet a necessity. The greater portion of the campers' food this year will come directly from the camp's own fields, where the greatest variety of fresh fruits and vegetables will be grown. The camp has obtained numerous farm implements and machinery in addition to two horses. A farmer, with a great many years' experience in farm management, has been employed by the camp and has assumed full charge of the crops and livestock. In addition to the two horses, the camp has obtained chickens and other livestock. The chickens, besides providing Sunday dinners, will supply eggs for the table all season.

Most of the activities at Camp Stella Maria this year will take place right on the campus, due to lack of transportation facilities. There will be many more hikes—on foot—as bus trips will be impossible. The camp program this year will emphasize body-building routines and physical development.

This year, more than ever before, children need the benefits of camp life. Adult anxiety, working parents, the unusual way of life, have reflected on the child of pre-adolescence more than on any other group. As there will be no family vacations as before, as there must be far fewer trips to the beaches, camp this year can solve many parents' problems.

National Honor Won By Mercy Publication

"Mercedes" semiannual magazine published at Our Lady of Mercy High School has been awarded All American honors by the National Scholastic Press Association of the University of Michigan. This is the eighth year that such an honor has been captured by the magazine.

Religious Vacation Schools Opening Set

While operation of Religious Vacation Schools in the Rural area will be curtailed, this summer, due to gasoline and rubber shortages, it is planned to open the city schools program on July 6 and to close on July 28.

Materials for the Religious Vacation Schools will be prepared by the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, office of which is at 90 Chestnut St., Rochester, and will be shipped direct to the Pastors. Projects to be used are: "Jesus, My Life," "The Commandment Project," "The Eternal Sacrifice" (the Mass), and the "Life of Christ" for the oldest group.

The Rev. George C. Vogt, diocesan director of the Confraternity, has released the following statement on the 1943 summer schools:

"There is need for the Religious Vacation Schools even though public school children receive religious instructions during the school term. One period a week in religion is entirely inadequate even to instruct children in their religion which has to really educate them.

"The nearest approximation to religious education for the public school children is given during Vacation Schools by the Sisters. The solution of leakage through the public schools will not be found by retreating from the problem but by attacking it boldly and giving these children the best we have in the way of religious education."
