


Her Whole Family Enlisted

Nation Proud of WAAC Says Msgr. Ready On Inspection Trip

PT. OGLETHORPE, Ga.—The nation is proud of the service being rendered by the members of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, said in addressing the assembled members of the Third WAAC Training Center here.

Monsignor Ready was one of a small group of religious leaders who, at the invitation of Lt. Gen. Breckin Somervell, Commander of the Army Service Forces, visited the WAAC Training Center at Fort Des Moines, Ia., and here. Accompanying Monsignor Ready were Col. George F. Rixey, Deputy Chief of Chaplains; Col. Oveta Culp Hobby, Director of the WAACs; Bishop W. W. Peele, Method. at Episcopal Church of Richmond; and Rabbi R. B. Brickner of Cleveland, Ohio.

Move the Answer

Monsignor Ready, chosen to appear with Colonel Hobby after receiving the dress parade of WAACs, said:

"Word cannot tell how proud I am to be here and how very proud I am that the U.S.A. has the WAAC. We were in wonderment a year ago when the WAAC was started. We have the answer. You have given the answer to Hitler and Mussolini and the rest, who thought you and your brothers would not defend the freedom of the United States. You answered that challenge. We're proud of you."

Colonel Hobby told the WAACs that they were engaged in a communal undertaking in which freedom of religion is a principal factor. "Church and State," she said, "have a common objective in this war. At this time the total strength of all the people is needed. And that is why women in uniform are a symbol of all that the free people of the world hold dear."

In a prepared statement the religious leaders said:

"We are convinced of the tasks assigned to the WAACs. Their program of training is the result of careful planning, and its administration is in the hands of competent personnel. We feel that parents concerned about the moral and spiritual welfare of their daughters can be reassured."

"We found careful provision for their housing, health and recreation. Their program of training includes educational, professional, cultural and religious pursuits. Particularly noteworthy is the intelligence and care being given to the nature of their spiritual life. This is provided through the chaplaincy and through contact with civilian church life."

"There is ample evidence that this experience will strengthen their womanly character. The broad program makes them better trained individuals, more ready to do their duty for the duration. However, we find them eagerly

LENINGRAD AUXILIARY NAMED LITHUANIA BISHOP

VATICAN CITY—As of May 27, His Holiness Pope Pius XII has transferred the Most Rev. Theodore Matulevicius from the post of Auxiliary to the Apostolic Administrator of Leningrad to Bishop of Kaunas, Lithuania.

The Most Rev. Theodore Matulevicius was named Titular Bishop of Matraga and Auxiliary to the Apostolic Administrator of Leningrad in December, 1938. He was impeached from 1938 to 1939 and again from 1939 to 1940. Then he was exiled to Lithuania.
