St. Theodore's School, Gates, is back again. This time the Third and Fourth Grade want to ransom Rose Miriam from Edina. Little Wilhelmina Strohler, who is only 3 years old, wants to ransom a baby from Edina, too. She would like her baby to be baptized Mary Wilhelmina.

Alfred Dixon of the Seventh Grade at St. Boniface School has been working real hard for the missions. He has given a donation of \$5 wherever it is most needed. That is grand, Alfred.

The boys and girls of the Fourth and Fifth Grade of St. Mary's School, Demarest, have asked for a little negro baby. Their choice is a baby from China to be baptized Rose Miriam. Your request shall be granted very soon.

I received a real surprise when I received a letter from Mr. Peter and Paula's School. The children have saved enough money this year to ransom 122 negro babies. Isn't that excellent work? The Eighth Grade have adopted a baby, the Seventh and Eighth, 1; the Sixth Grade, 1; Fifth Grade, 1; Fourth Grade, 2; Third Grade, 1; and Second Grade, 2. They also save in some money for missions. I am very proud of you boys and girls of St. Peter and Paula's School.

The people of St. Mary's School of Roslyn want to do their share, too. They saved enough for two

babies. They want their babies to be adopted in Africa. The Rev. Fr. Ruth and the others will receive the sum of \$100. Thank you for your generosity.

Sister M. Amelia Hasson, M.M.C. Funeral services for Sister M. Amelia of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph were held in Holy Family Chapel at Nazareth Convent, Pittsford on Thursday morning, June 16, 1943.

Bolema Mass of Resurrection was celebrated by the Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, Doctor of the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart assisted by the Rev. Thomas J. McVeigh as Deacon and the Rev. John T. Callahan as Sub-Deacon. The Rev. Edward J. Lutz, chaplain of Nazareth College, was Master of Ceremonies.

Present in the cemetery were the Reverend Fathers Joseph H. Gaffel, Louis Kallman, John J. Duffy and Leo E. Davis. Interment was made in the Sister Plot in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery and the Last Recessional was given by Monsignor Burns assisted by the Rev. Joseph Gaffel and the Rev. John T. Callahan.

Sister Amelia was born in Rochester and became a Sister of St. Joseph in 1919. She taught for many years in the Parochial Schools of the diocese and dedicated herself to the care of the Indian children in the old Cathedral and the Sacred Heart schools of this city. St. Mary's School, Waterloo, and St. Patrick's, Demarest. Sister Amelia survived by a number of places and persons who reside in Rochester.
