Soldiers' Faith Edifies Pupils, Hawaii Nuns State

HONOLULU — The vigorous Catholicity of American soldiers who visit the chapel attached to their convent is a priceless aid in their work among school children and natives, it is reported by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet who teach on the island of Maui.
American soldiers come to the convent chapel for Mass on Sunday, and are supplied by breakfast afterwards, by the Sisters. The nuns also provide the soldiers with a reading room, supplied with Catholic literature and facilities for writing letters home. Most of the soldiers remain for Benediction in the afternoon. The soldiers on their part have shown their gratitude to the Sisters in a number of different ways.

They insist on being permitted to do various chores, and have done repair jobs about the premises that they observed to be needed.
On one occasion, when the convent's antiquated radio gave up the ghost, the soldiers surprised the Sisters with a new receiving set. They are now able to hear news broadcasts from continental

United States, they report. The Rev. Edmund C. Silney, Lieutenant Colonel in the Chaplains' Corps, accompanies the soldiers on visits to the convent and school. Non-Catholic as well as Catholic soldiers will not let co-religionists get into their bunkers until they have knelt down and said their night prayers. Some soldiers go out each night to their foxholes to recite the Rosary, free from barracks disturbances.

Book By Archbishop Spellman Distributed In England

LONDON. — Archbishop Spellman's book "The Road to Victory" is to be distributed here by the Catholic publishers, Burns and Oates. It is stated that when Archbishop Spellman was here he offered 5,000 copies to the late Cardinal Hickey. The first consignment has arrived.
