Loyalty and patriotism of faculty, graduates and student body were stressed. Symbols of what lies ahead for the Aquinas Institute graduates was the presence in the graduating class of a U. S. Marine, Leland V. Gardner, in uniform.

Our Lady of Mercy High School

At the twelfth annual commencement exercises of Our Lady of Mercy High School, the 104 girls received their diplomas and awards from His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, Friday, June 18.

In their traditional white caps and gowns and blue hoods the graduates filed to the stage to the strains of a new march "On To Victory" by a Sister of Mercy. Immediately following the American's Creed, recited by Margaret German, came the Salute to the Flag and the National Anthem.

His Excellency stressed the value of the training the graduates had received. "You are prepared," the Bishop said, "to meet any situation with a Christian attitude because of your training in Catholic principles. Your training will stand you in good stead in the perilous days ahead."

Grace Dobbertin recited the class poem. The Valedictory Address was given by Annette Mattee. The graduates conducted by Ruth Hyde were heard in the chorus "Guard Well Thy Trust, America."

Aquinas Institute

Imminence of service to their country was evident at the impressive graduation of 201 boys at Aquinas Institute, Sunday night. The boys including one in the uniform of the United States Marine Corps received diplomas and awards from His Excellency, Bishop Kearney.

Bishop To Address First Friday Luncheon Group

Catholic men who will attend the July 2 session of the First Friday Luncheon Club will hear His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, address them on the day marking the Feast of the Sacred Heart at Hotel Segansors.

The First Friday Luncheon Club comprised of all Catholics seen who received Holy Communion that morning and who desire to assemble for luncheon that noon has for its main purpose devotion to the Sacred Heart and the club will have the members' own Bishop for a speaker, Father Hotaler stated.

"You are graduating into a strange world," His Excellency told the graduates. "We had visualized you as priests, doctors, dentists and businessmen. But the picture has changed. Aquinas has laid the foundations for you to become better men, Christian men. It has trained you in discipline and to make sacrifices. You are ready for whatever you are called upon to do."

Citing great men of the Church who achieved greatness by overcoming difficulties, the Bishop said: "We pledge the prayers of our people, of your Bishop and priests and teachers for your whatever may be your duty."

Leland V. Gardner was the member of the class in the Marine uniform. A medley of songs of the various services in the armed forces sung by the class drew prolonged applause. Centerpiece on the stage was an American Flag of flowers.

Strange prospects lie before us, Valedictorian Robert E. Glass said. I do not know what is in store for us, in the struggle for victory, he declared, but "I do know we shall try."
