Regents Exams 'Unfair' Declares Bishop Kearney

Characterizing this year's Regents examinations as "very unfair," His Excellency, Bishop Kearney speaking at Aquinas Institute's graduation, Sunday night, termed the examinations as "one of the most unreasonable sets of questions" on record.

The Bishop made it clear that he was not only speaking for his own boys and girls but for all throughout the state who have been working this year, not alone to get their scholastic work, but to cooperate wholeheartedly in the war effort. His Excellency cited the outstanding achievements of schools like Aquinas Institute in the War Bond and Stamp campaigns, in salvage drives, in the Victory Corps and other effort cooperating with the government in prosecuting the war.

Those who prepared this year's set of Regents examinations must have been so buried in scientific and other studies that they did not realize the country was at war, the Bishop continued.

Complaints have been made from all sections of the state, His Excellency said. The examinations were ridiculous when given at a time like this with class work interfered with more than ever in the history of schools in the state. "One would think that if anything the examinations might have been a little easier this year in view of the service the students were called upon to render."

War Ration III Book Can Only Be Obtained Aug. 1

Applications for War Ration Book III cannot now be made to local War Price and Rationing Boards the Office of Price Administration emphasized today. Not until Aug. 1 will local boards accept such applications from persons who failed to apply by mail before June 10, or from persons who did apply but for some reason, do not receive books.

Since the June 10 deadline for mailing applications passed, the OPA explained, local boards have been flooded with requests to be permitted to apply for War Ration Book No. 3. Local boards will not have application forms available until after Aug. 1. Persons will have sufficient time then to procure the new replacement ration book since the book will not be used until late August or early September.

will not receive it because the information on the application card was illegible or because names or addresses were not set forth on the application card.

Persons who receive War Ration Book No. 3 should not take the book to their Local Board to have information filled in on the cover. No board action is necessary, the OPA said. All the holder of a War Ration Book No. 3 is required to do upon receiving his book is to write in his address, age, sex, weight, height, occupation and signature in the space provided on the cover. No other information or action is necessary.

'Underground' Battles For Christian Rule

LIBERON.—Included in a package containing a number of copies of Polish underground newspapers received here, according to advices to KAP, Polish Catholic Press Agency, were several copies of Prawda (The Truth), the leading Catholic organ of underground Poland. Fighting for a just form of government based on Christian principles, Prawda has made enormous gains in circulation since 1942, when it first appeared, and has outlined its policy in these words:

"Some time ago we adopted the watchword: 'Any system with God is good, any system without God is bad.' That is our whole political creed. We do not formulate our own political program, we do not indulge in controversies with existing movements; but we do definitely oppose any political activities in Poland that may be contrary to the principles of Catholic faith and morality! We demand honesty. We have confined our political program to demanding honest laws, honest government and honest political and social work."
