Safeguarding Home Said Most Patriotic Duty

Travellers representing the 3000 members of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, in convention at Hamilton, Ontario, were told that the most patriotic duty for them today is that of safeguarding the home.

Mrs. F. J. McCarry of Kitchener, Ont., the national president, told the 3rd annual national meeting that "Today is a world at war, when children are temporarily deprived of their fathers, mothers must remain at their posts for children's needs have the highest priority rating."

"Your soul, your patriotism and your enthusiasm for your war work must not for a moment carry your mind away from the fact that it is on the strength of our spiritual life that the right rebuilding of our national life depends."

Some indication of what members across Canada are doing in a variety of patriotic endeavors on the home front and for members of the Armed Forces was shown in reports of which salient points were:

Total sum raised by members during the year was \$27,197.

Expenditures for war services was \$4,377.

Assistance to the Red Cross Society included \$16,342 in cash and donations of 24,000 knitted articles and 77,115 sewn articles.

The sum of \$18,120 was spent on cigarettes and boxes for troops overseas, 194,663 cigarettes and 4,218 books were sent to the troops.

There were distributed to camps, army huts and hospitals 137,000 books and magazines.

Religious articles supplied in chaplains totaled \$2,000.

Entertainment provided for 20,000 members of the armed forces and the merchant marine.

Laywomen Retreat Group At St. Louis

ST. LOUIS—With the Most Rev. John J. Glennon, Archbishop of St. Louis, as host, the 15th national congress of the Laywomen's Retreat Movement will meet here July 5 to 8, to discuss the retreat movement and its relation to restoring the Christian home in the current emergency period.

Issuing a welcome, Archbishop Glennon said: "It is important in these tragic days when moral standards are threatened; when the sacred bond of matrimony is all too easily broken; when juvenile delinquency is alarmingly on the increase; for the mothers and daughters of the nation to come together with the high and holy purpose to see how best the home, the Church and the nation, under God's Benediction, may be preserved."

Mrs. Charles Schmel, of Madison, Wis., is national president of the organization. Among those who will address the convention are the Rev. Peter Furlan, C.S.B., of LaSalle, Ind.; the Rev. Edward Lodge Curran, of Brooklyn; and the Very Rev. Martin Hellmigel, of St. Louis.

The Congress will be opened with a Solemn Pontifical Mass, at which Archbishop Glennon will officiate, in St. Louis Cathedral on July 5.

Hint For Housewives

If your cleaning company representative says: "Sorry—no gloves cleaned these days," it is because of shortages of cleaning fluids and workers, as well as restrictions on deliveries. 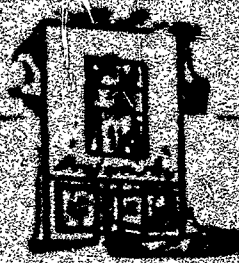
