Scores High School Sex Education Program

ST. PAUL.—Denouncing the action of "those responsible for public order and education acting as sex education as a panacea for juvenile delinquency," the Rev. Dr. N. G. Bendas, Archdiocesan Director of the Catholic Youth Council, outlined a six-point series of objections to the sex education course drawn up by the Minnesota Health Department's division of preventable diseases for junior and senior public high school students.

Dr. Bendas' letter opposed the program on the following grounds:
1. The program is based on the unwarranted principle that merit information will best stem lying;
2. The program leaves out of consideration the training of the will;
3. The program lacks proper motivation;
4. The program is materialistic;
5. The program is public and collective; it does not take into consideration the individual and relative needs of young people;
6. The program transfers the task of imparting sex instruction from those who by nature or by professional training are commissioned to give it—parents and spiritual directors—to persons of doubtful competency.
