(ig) Williams Menger are Deacon and Subdeacon of the Mass. Serving as Masters of Ceremonies are Lieut. Eugene B. LeGault and the Rev. Lawrence B. Cussey, Secretary to the Bishop. The minor officers and servers of the Mass will be enlisted men from the station.

The entire program has attracted national interest. Chaplain Father LeGault has announced. Many of the newest cameramen, including those from MGM, Paramount, Universal, Pathe and the March of Time will be on hand to photograph the ceremonies. Likewise all the news gathering agencies will be present to give proper news coverage.

This military field Mass will be celebrated on F Unit drill field, one of the five recruit training drill fields at the Station. The drill field slopes gradually toward the shore of Seneca Lake, offering an exceptionally dramatic setting for the occasion. It is flanked on four sides by barracks, drill hall, mess hall and other buildings composing the training unit.

"Both in its religious and patriotic aspects," Father LeGault says, "the affair is expected to prove of a highly impressive nature." The entire crowd will join in singing "The Star Spangled Banner" at the conclusion of the Mass. The procession led by the Crossbearer, flanked by the American Flag and the Standards of Sampson and accompanied by a Color Guard, under the command of Captain Harry A. Badt and Captain Joseph Coleman, Executive Officer, will escort Bishop Kearney from the temporary field altar to a nearby drill hall.

Philippine President Tells How U.S. Priest Refuses To Quit Isles

CHICAGO (NC) — The recent announcement of the imprisonment by the Japanese of Colonel Edwin Rohan, Chicago Passionist priest was given new interest this week by the receipt of a letter from President Manuel Quizon to Chaplain Rohan's brother, Stephen T. Rohan, Chicago attorney and member of the Catholic Lawyers Guild here. Mr. Rohan wrote to the Philippine President a year ago when it was believed that his brother was in Japanese hands. President Quizon's illness was responsible for the delay.

The letter of President Quizon said: "When I was about to leave Corregidor, I told Father Edwin that he could come with me. He answered that he would think it over and asked me to join him in prayer for Divine Guidance. The following day he came to see me and told me that he had already decided it was his duty to remain in Corregidor."

Here's Choice Made
Colonel Rohan, Chief Chaplain of the Philippine Military Administration was stationed at Fort Mills, Corregidor Island when that fortress fell.

Describing his choice President Quizon says:
"It was his spirit of self-sacrifice, his desire to serve your people and our people beyond the demands of his position that have brought about his present situation. You and we deplore it, but I have no doubt he is spiritually happy. I can see Father Edwin giving comfort and solace to the men in the prison camp and I can see him thanking Almighty God for the opportunity He has given him to sacrifice himself for the love of Our Lord and the love of his fellowmen."

Leaves \$19,000

Philadelphia — A total of \$19,000 was bequeathed to Catholic charities and institutions from the estate of Clinton R. Sisset, who died at his summer home, Cape May Point, N. J., under terms of his will which was filed for probate here. The will directed bequests of \$5,000 each for St. Edmund's Home for Crippled children, St. James' Church and St. Leonard's Academy here, and \$2,000 each for the Little Sisters of the Poor here, and the Catholic Church at Cape May, N. J.
