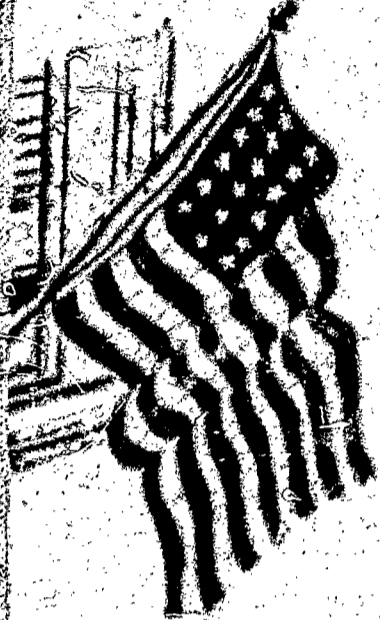

C. D. of A. To Meet  
In Cleveland, July 12

CLEVELAND. — (NC) — The  
twentieth annual national con-  
vention of the Catholic Daughters  
of America, which will be held  
here July 12 to 16, will be strictly  
religious and confined strictly to re-  
ligious and business sessions. It  
has been announced by Miss Mary  
C. Duffy, Supreme Regent of the  
organization.

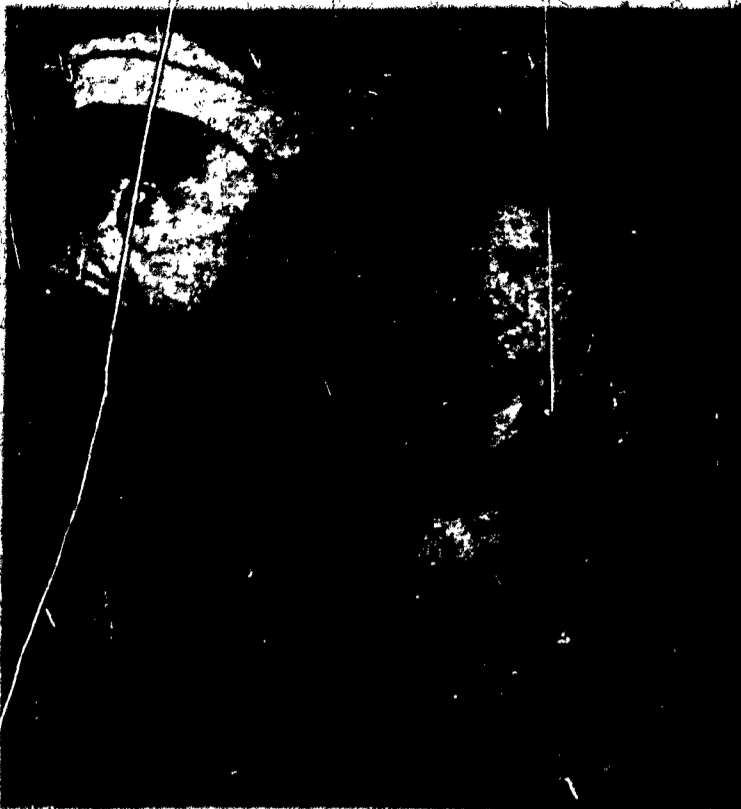
The convention, which usually  
runs five days, has been cut to  
three days and all social and re-  
creational functions have been  
eliminated in order to comply with  
the wartime travel and other re-  
strictions, Miss Duffy said.

The convention will be opened  
with the celebration of Solemn  
Pontifical Mass in St. John's Ca-  
thedral, at which the Most Rev.  
Edward P. Hoban, Coadjutor Bish-  
op of Cleveland, will pontificate.  
The Most Rev. William J. Hasey,  
Bishop of Scranton and National  
Chaplain of the Catholic Daugh-  
ters of America, will preach the  
sermon. Convention attendance is  
being limited to members of the  
Hierarchy, national officers and di-  
rectors, state regents and delega-  
tions and it is expected 200 will  
attend.

WAR STAMP DRIVE  
JULY 1 TO AUG. 31

Our National President's Message  
July 1, 1945, has a very special  
significance for the Catholic women  
of America, for on this day—the  
eve of the Feast of the Sacred  
Heart—a War Stamp Campaign  
officially opens. The campaign,  
if successful, will assure the main-  
tenance of the National Catholic  
School of Social Service for future  
years. This School is unique in  
that it is maintained by lay women.  
All of us realize the need for  
Catholic trained social service  
workers; this need will be multi-  
plied many times in post-war re-  
habilitation. Be sure you "Give  
a Stamp and Get a Stamp."

Reports show that Catholic  
women everywhere are engaged in  
wartime activities which include  
cooperation with the National  
Catholic Community Service. If  
a USO club is in your vicinity we  
are certain that you have volun-  
teered, but very often the club  
is situated in some remote place,  
and for this too we must feel our  
responsibility. For this reason, we  
are suggesting that a committee  
cooperating with the National  
Catholic Community Service be  
established in every parish council  
and affiliated unit to recruit  
volunteers to help in clubs both  
near and far. Our own boys and  
girls may find themselves in  
camps near USO clubs where  
there is little, if any, Catholic  
participation. After all, these boys  
and girls are our boys and girls,  
and if we cannot serve our own  
we have the privilege through the  
USO of serving others. Members  
of the National Council of Catho-  
lic Women have been effective in  
volunteer activities ever since the  
last war. We have proven our  
value with the Red Cross, Chap-  
lain's Aid, Office of Civilian De-  
fense and the many other fields  
where success depends entirely  
upon the zeal of volunteers. A  
director of a USO club is success-  
ful only if he or she has good  
volunteers participating. We, the  
experienced Catholic volunteers,  
can insure "A Home Away From  
Home" for our boys and girls  
everywhere.

No leisure time for Catholic  
women this summer! There is no  
leisure time for our armed forces  
either. They are fighting that we  
may live; we are working and  
praying that they may live. Our  
War Stamp Campaign will make  
certain that there will be bullets,  
grenade boys, and ammunition to  
win the war, and Catholic women

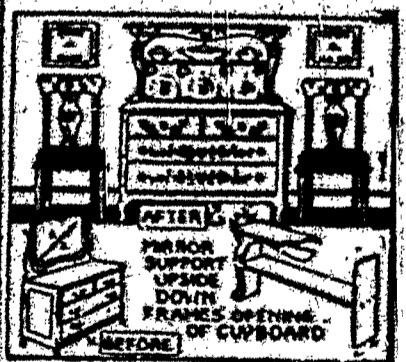
trained especially to give service

A Timely Hint for the War Bride  
If you are furnishing a combina-  
tion living and dining room with  
odd and ends from the family  
attic why not use paint and in-  
expensive fabrics to harmonize in-  
related pieces?

Here a combination chest and  
desk cupboard has been made  
from an old dresser. The cup-  
board at the lower right fits on  
top of the dresser and a quarter



rotted molding nailed to the  
dresser top holds plates in place.  
Both dresser and chairs are painted  
cream color and quaint Dutch  
designs in gay colors are stenciled  
on them. The chair seat cov-  
ers repeat the colors in these de-  
signs. Pieces of the cracked mir-  
ror of the old dresser are cut to  
fit painted picture frames and  
typical Dutch tulip designs are  
stenciled on the glass.

NOTE: The painted and stenciled  
designs used by Early Dutch  
settlers in America are full of  
sentiment for us today. The Dove  
of Peace and Hearts and Flowers  
were favorites. Mrs. Spears has
