Mrs. Bebbington Rites Held

Waverly Funeral of Mrs. Mary Doherty Bebbington, wife of Thomas Bebbington, who died June 24 1943 in Lowell, Mass., was held here on Monday, June 28. Solemn Requiem Mass was offered in St. James Church by the Rev. Edward J. Lyons with the Rev. James B. Keenan, Deacon and the Rev. Charles Murooney of Sayre, Pa., as Subdeacon. Mrs. Bebbington was manager of the Waverly Western Union office for many years. When she was in Waverly she was a member of St. James Church and the Catholic Daughters of America. Besides her husband, Mrs. Bebbington is survived by one son, Thomas Jr.; her father, Joseph Drobnyk, and one sister, Mrs. Francis O'Brien of Sayre.

Aged Woman Dies

Dr. L. S. Betowski, a Toga county coroner, said that her death was the result of accidental asphyxiation.

Mrs. Felicitas had been a resident of Waverly and South Waverly for 30 years, having been a native of Italy.

She is survived by two sons, Nicholas of South Waverly and John with whom she resided, five grandchildren and one great grandchild; and several nieces and nephews.

The body was removed from the Alteri funeral home in Sayre to the home of her son Nicholas, 63 Reel Street, South Waverly.

The funeral was held from there Tuesday morning, June 29 at 9 o'clock, with requiem high mass in St. James Church at 9:30, celebrated by Rev. Edward J. Lyons, pastor. Burial was in St. James cemetery.

OWEGO—Several former pupils of St. Patrick's Parochial School, who were honor students while attending that institution continue their high scholastic records in their work in the Owego Free Academy. At the annual commencement exercises of the Academy last week, these pupils were among those who received awards for their high scholastic work. Mary Ellen Donnelly, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Donnelly acquired an average of 94% in Civics and was awarded a share of the \$5 Kiwanis Club prize, another student having obtained the same average. Thomas Donnelly, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Donnelly received a similar prize in Civics, he having obtained an average of 85%. May Donnelly, sister of Thomas Donnelly, received a gold medal for outstanding work in editing the School News, which appears weekly in the local papers. Florence Cuvello was also awarded a prize for her splendid work in the editing of the Tom Tom, the school's Year Book. May Donnelly also received a \$10 award for having attained the highest average in three years of Latin, her average being 90%. The Emma Alumnae Key, awarded to the student having attained an excellent standing in high school subjects and also for her characteristics and her interest in extra-curricular activities, was this year given to Loretta Jerome, a junior in the High School. Miss Jerome is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael P. Jerome.

The Ingredients
 Combine 1/2 pound ground beef, 1/4 pound ground pork, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup grated raw onion and 1/2 cup raw rice. Remove core from cabbage and steam until leaves begin to wilt.



Making the Rolls
 Shape meat and rice mixture into loose rolls and wrap each meat roll in a cabbage leaf. Fasten with a wooden pick. Place in baking dish.



Meat-Filled Leaves
 Cover with water. Cover and cook in a moderate oven (350° F.) for one and one-half hours, or until rice is done. Serve with sauce and fresh fruit.

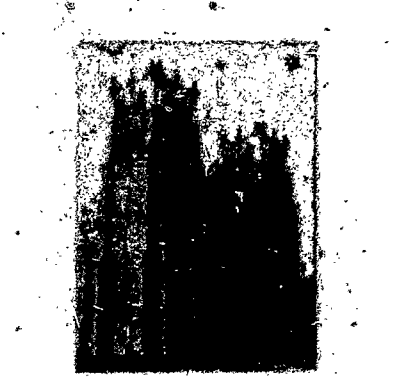
