

Divorces Far Outnumber Marriages in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES — Divorces are outnumbering marriages in certain instances daily more than two to one in Los Angeles County a study of the vital statistics in daily newspapers indicates.

In one Los Angeles daily last week there were recorded 67 legal separations as opposed to 23 marriages.

Additional to the legal separations were records of 29 new divorces being filed.

Postpone Action On Sterilization Bill

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — The Alabama State Senate has voted an indefinite postponement of a bill which would provide for the legalization of sterilizing the feeble-minded and persons who suffer from certain hereditary forms of insanity.

The action was taken following a brief debate between the sponsor of the measure, Senator Bruce Henderson, of Wilcox, and Senator Vincent Kilborn of Mobile, on the necessity for the sterilization. Senator Kilborn, following the exchange, moved to postpone the bill indefinitely, and Senator Henderson countered by moving to table the motion. The move to table was defeated and the indefinite postponement was voted.

CANADIAN CHAPLAIN KILLED IN MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT

KENTVILLE, N. S. — A few minutes after he had celebrated Mass in the Knights of Columbus chapel at Aldershot military camp, near here, Captain the Rev. Omer Beghin, 39-year-old Catholic chaplain of Les Voltigeurs, a Quebec unit, was fatally injured in a fall from his motorcycle.

He had said the 7 o'clock Mass, and left the chapel at 8 A. M. He was found unconscious by two soldiers within five minutes. Taken to the Aldershot military camp he died six hours later without regaining consciousness.
