

Bishop Encourages First Friday Devotion Of Laymen

In these times of great human suffering, devotion to the Sacred Heart, as manifested by the First Friday Luncheon Club members, should be given every encouragement. "We can expect that the Sacred Heart of Jesus is going to be deeply touched with the human suffering in the world today."

This message was given by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, to the First Friday Luncheon Club at its session on the Feast of the Sacred Heart at Hotel Sagamore, July 2.

Under the personal guidance of the Bishop, as State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, the group was formed last December. Started with 30 Catholic laymen, the number present on July 2 was 72.

Motivated by Faith
His Excellency pointed out that the organization was motivated by one particular phase of religiosity. He expressed his appreciation to the priests on the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary who have enthusiastically given of their services as speakers.

Citing the promises of the Sacred Heart to St. Margaret Mary, the Bishop stressed the special blessings that come from promoting the devotion. The whole idea of the movement from beginning to end has been deeply religious.

To bring home the significance of the devotion at this time of trial and to emphasize the need for keeping men's thoughts on the

Sacred Heart. His Excellency quoted an article from "The Sign" magazine touching upon the little boy's plea to his mother, "Have a Heart, Mom."

His Excellency said, speaking of the Sacred Heart of Jesus: "Let us go to Him and I don't believe He will be surprised, upset or resentful, if we say 'O Divine Lord, Have a Heart!'"

The Rev. Raymond G. Hezel, moderator, presided. At the speaker's table also were the Rev. John S. Whalen, the Rev. William J. Schiffetti, the Rev. Albert J. Shadron, and the Rev. Bernard V. Kuchman. Frank B. Wolfe, President of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Society was chairman.

Father Hezel announced that the club would again meet on Friday, August 6, at Hotel Sagamore.
