'If In Doubt Put It Out'

In a policy statement on civilian protection released this week by Louis H. Cartwright, Director of Civilian Protection, he states: "Air reports on the blackout of June 23 indicate that some unattended lights in the City of Rochester were visible from a 25 to 30-mile distance at an altitude of 4,000 feet. Had this area been subjected to an actual air raid at that time, these lights would have given enemy fliers an excellent guide to their targets. "Under Army Air Raid Protection Regulations No. 1 now in force in forty states, unattended lighting is not permitted at any time during the hours of darkness. This ruling applies every night, whether or not there is a blackout. "The Army considers all lights unattended unless some individual has been given the responsibility of turning them out on the sounding of an air raid alarm. This means that those who have installed outside switches must make definite arrangements to have those switches operated in the event of a blackout. "The operation of these switches cannot be left to chance. The air raid wardens, police and auxiliary police have been told specifically that they are not responsible for extinguishing these lights. Unless it is proved to the contrary, the Office of Civilian Protection, for the time being, will assume that certain individuals are assigned by the owners to all outdoor switches. "A plan has been formulated whereby police will make a nightly city-wide check on unattended lighting. Where violations are noted, the individual for the time being will be informed of the

Catholic Press Rises Above Ten Million Mark in Circulation

NEW YORK (NC) — The latest compilation of the Catholic Press in the United States indicates a total circulation of 10,000,574. The compilation is contained in a new book entitled "Religious Press Directory," issued here by Joseph F. Wagner, Inc., and containing not only data on the Catholic Press, but also the religious press in general. This latest study, compared with "Catholic Press Directory" for a year previous, indicates a growth in circulation of 882,219 for the year. The new book lists 2,326,554 as the circulation of 311 of the 373 publications mentioned. Of publications whose circulation is not indicated, on the same basis that was used in the 1942 "Catholic Press Directory," would add 272,320 to the total figure. The publisher of the new directory is also the publisher of "Catholic Buyers Guide," "Church Goods News Bulletin," "Journal of Religious Instruction," and "Homiletic and Pastoral Review." It also published "The Catholic Press Directory" for 1942 for Joseph H. Meier, Chicago, its compiler. The new book lists religious publications with various indexes: alphabetical according to denomination, by frequency of issue, and by States and cities. It also lists paid circulation of religious publications accepting advertising and giving circulation statements, and gives names of parish and community papers, etc.
