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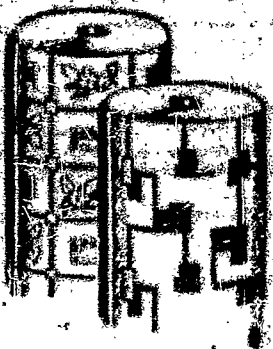
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Nurse Meets Fellow Auburnians Overseas

WOMEN'S COMMUNION SET

By MARIE ROSE BARRON AUBURN — Next Sunday will be the Communion Day of the Rosary and Scapular Society and all the women of the congregation. NOVENA EXERCISES

The exercises of the Novena of the Miraculous Medal are held every Sunday and Wednesday evening at 7:30. There is a Mass offered each week for all those who take part in the devotion of the Miraculous Medal.

The annual Triduum in honor of St. Anne will be held in St. Mary's Church on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 22, 23 and 24. The Triduum will close with Communion on the Feast Monday, July 26, when there will be a High Mass at 8 o'clock in honor of St. Ann.

FEAST OF OUR LADY

The Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel will be observed on Friday, July 16. It recalls the origin and privileges of the brown Scapular. Tradition tells us that the Blessed Virgin appeared to St. Simon Stock and handed to him the brown scapular, similar in color and material to that worn by his Order, and made to him the following promise: "Receive my beloved son, this habit of thy Order. This shall be to thee and to all Carmelites a privilege that whoever dies clothed in this shall never suffer eternal fire."

There is no obligation to wear the Brown Scapular or to believe its history but the church encourages the wearing of the scapular by the granting of indulgences and has established the Feast in honor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. The advantages

which we derive from wearing the Scapular are three fold: It puts us under the particular protection of Mary; it makes us participants in all the good works of the Carmelite order; and places within our reach numerous graces. Most people are enrolled in the Brown Scapular at the time of First Holy Communion. There is a plenary indulgence granted to each one on the day he enters the Confraternity, at the hour of death and every year on the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. There are also many other indulgences granted, a list of these indulgences being published in a booklet explaining the devotion.

There are eighteen different kinds of Scapulars, but the scapular most used is the Brown Scapular. The word scapular comes from the Latin scapula meaning shoulder and is the name of a part of the habit of many Religious Orders and Congregations. The author of "Fifteen Minutes at the Feet of Our Lady of Mount Carmel" suggests that those who make a practice of saying seven Our Fathers and Hail Marys daily add after the Our Father the following prayers: "—My Mother of Carmel, blessed be thou, and let all the Angels, the saints, and the just praise thee, because thou hast given me thy holy Scapular; 2—My Mother of Carmel, blessed be thou, and let the Seraphim, the saints, and the just praise thee, because with thy holy Scapular thou dost protect me against all dangers; 3—My Mother of Carmel, blessed be thou, and let Thrones, the saints, and the just praise thee, because with thy holy Scapular, thou art my salvation; 4—My Mother of Carmel, blessed be thou, and let the Dominations, the saints, and the just praise thee, because with thy Scapular, thou defendest me against the temptations of mine enemies; 5—My Mother of Carmel, blessed be thou and let the Cherubim, the Saints and the just praise thee, because with thy Scapular thou art the peace and happiness of my soul; 6—My Mother of Carmel, blessed be thou, and let the Archangels, the saints, and the just praise thee, because with thy Scapular, thou hast adopted me as thine own child; 7—My Mother, my most cherished Queen and Mother, to thee, I give my heart, my soul, and my life! Blessed be thou, and let the Virtues and all creatures praise thee, because with thy Scapular thou hast given me the sweet hope of seeing thee in heaven! Forgive me not, my Mother!"

Final Tribute Paid Thos. Toner, Veteran Geneva Fireman

GENEVA — Funeral services for Thomas Toner, 53, veteran fireman, who was fatally hurt in a fall from the Nester Hose Company fire truck on Saturday, July 3, while firemen were answering an alarm, was held on Thursday morning at 8:30 o'clock from the Nester Hose Company and at 9 o'clock in St. Francis de Sales Church. Interment was in St. Patrick's Cemetery.

Surviving Mr. Toner are his two sisters, Mrs. Catherine Moore and Mrs. Mae Scholz; one brother, James L. Toner, all of Geneva; several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Toner was a member of the Nester Hose Company and served from 1910 to 1914 in the United States Marine Corps. He was a member of Company B from 1914 to 1918 and during World War I served in France with the 307th Field Artillery, 78th Division.

A regular high mass was celebrated by the Rev. Rev. Msgr. Walter J. Lee, V.F., and Rev. William O'Brien officiated at the interment. Bearers were members of the Nester Hose Company including Martin J. Broderick, Harry Linahan, Joseph Gavin, Fred Schmitt, Charles Mosey and John Toole.

Military honors were accorded and a firing escort under the command of Sergeant Cecil Thomas consisted of members of Company B. George Taylor was bugler.
