THE SCAPULAR MILITIA

At this time when we are commemorating on July 16 the Feast Day of Our Blessed Lady of Mt. Carmel and of the Scapular, we are making a special appeal for more men and women to become members of the Scapular Militia. The Corpus Christi Post of the Scapular Militia was organized in

April, 1943, under the auspices of the Rosary Society. It now has 115 members. The number of indulgences and the spiritual benefits derived from being a member are so numerous we feel certain there must be hundreds more in our parish who are willing and able to take part in this worthy cause. When Our Blessed Mother appeared to Saint Simon Stock on July 16, 1251, and gave him the Brown Scapular, she said: "What-

soever thou doest in this shall not suffer eternal fire." Surely, with a promise like this, one dollar is not too much of an offering or sacrifice for any of us to make in order to help clothe all our men in the Armed Forces in this garment of Our Lady. Both metal and medals are becoming very difficult to obtain and as the demand for cloth Scapulars is becoming increasing by great numbers, an indulgence of 500 days each time it is kissed applied only to the cloth Scapular.

Those who wish to make the Scapulars may, by donating \$1.00, share in 200 Masses a year for two years, besides receiving 100 days' indulgence for each Scapular made. Those making the donation of \$1.00 and not making the Scapulars share in the 200 Masses a year for one year. Their donation also helps to furnish material and defray the tremendous expense connected with the undertaking. Members paying 25c may, by making 46 Scapulars, share in the Militia Masses for one year and receive 100 days' indulgence for each Scapular made.

Masses may be applied to yourself, to others, or to deceased persons. By special privilege, deceased persons are remembered, not only in the Militia Masses, but also in 200 Masses a year of the Carmelite Purgatorial Society.

We look for great numbers, men as well as women, to answer this appeal. While you may have supplied your son with a Scapular medal, there are thousands who have no one to provide for them or who may have forgotten the great value of the Scapular. For these, and also to replace medals that have become lost or broken, we ask help in making the Brown Cloth Scapular possible.—M. K. TUESDAY NIGHT PARTIES
