HORNELL.—A special Mass to mark the golden jubilee in religion of Sister M. Victorine of the Sisters of Mercy is being planned in St. Ann's Church, here on July 27, to be followed by a jubilee dinner.

Sister Victorine's jubilee date was Monday and she, being on her vacation, marked the day quietly.

In her 58 year in the sisterhood, Sister M. Victorine has been in Hornell for 42 years and is widely known in the city. Before coming to St. Ann's convent here, she was located in Batavia, Corning and Elmira, and for about a year in St. James Mercy Hospital.

A native of Tryonville, near Warsaw, Sister M. Victorine entered the convent of the Sisters of Mercy at Batavia, when Hornell was included in the Buffalo diocese. This was in 1899. Three years later she took her final vows.

Sister M. Victorine, on vacation, is reported visiting at her birthplace where she is enjoying life on a farm as she did many years ago.

Every person attending St. Ann's School in the more than two score years of her service, knows Sister M. Victorine as a most charitable person, one who never has

refused to lend another a helping hand. Her associates have often said that no task was too difficult for her to perform, and that she is surrounded by children, who have called upon her when in need for various favors.

AVERS BRITAIN REJECTS YOUTH GROUPS OF AXIS TYPE

LONDON.—(NC)—"Let us make it clear to all concerned," said the Archbishop of Liverpool, the Most Rev. Richard Downey, in a message sent to a Liverpool Catholic youth gathering, "that we do not want anything modelled on or even remotely approaching the Hitler youth movement or the Balilla of Italy."

"A cut-and-dried State-regulated youth movement is not an inspiring ideal to a liberty-loving people. Centuries ago Sparta, in the interests of materialism, tried the experiment and the State of Sparta perished."

Holland Nazi Denied Catholic Burial

NEW YORK.—(NC)—A Dutch Nazi who was slain in a fight with anti-Nazis in the Netherlands has been refused burial in consecrated ground, according to word received by the Netherlands Information Bureau here.

At his funeral a deputy leader of the Nazi Party accused the Church of encouraging anti-Nazi resistance and was quoted in the Nazi organ Volk en Vaderland as saying this resistance would be avenged "with terror."

N.Y. Schools War Bond Drive Nets \$2,000,000

NEW YORK.—The 75,763 students in the parochial schools of the Archdiocese of New York, accounted for a total of \$2,019,070.21 in the War Savings Bond and Stamp campaign during the period from September, 1942, to April, 1943, the Treasury Department has announced.

The average purchase and sale per student during the period was \$26.64, or \$3.33 per month, which is well above the national monthly average of \$2.06.

The Treasury Department statement asserted that a major share of the credit for the showing belongs to the Very Rev. Msgr. William R. Kelly, superintendent of the schools, and the Rev. John Paul Havery, his assistant.
