

200 Volunteers Vie In DeSales Building Campaign

Geneva's Catholics Rally To Call For Needed Funds

Despite the hot weather about 200 men and women who are to carry on the DeSales High School rebuilding fund campaign met Sunday afternoon at St. Francis de Sales School hall on Exchange Street for final instructions in the campaign which is now underway.

Enthusiasm and confidence were expressed on all sides and the volunteers are now engaging in an effort to raise their share of the \$72,000 necessary for the building of the new wing of the school.

The meeting was opened with a brief message of encouragement from the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Walker J. Lee, V. F., honorary chairman of the campaign, who said that for two weeks past he had prepared his plans for this day when all would share in the greatest financial effort ever asked of the Catholic people of Geneva. He predicted the ultimate success of the campaign, basing his prediction on the generosity and sacrifice of the people.

Spurn No Effort

Associate Chairman Richard J.

Wolke and Thomas J. Comisky expressed their gratification at the unusually large attendance of capitalists and workers and said that such an open meeting surely indicated that no effort would be spared to bring success to the teams that would start out immediately to raise the necessary money.

During the instructions to the workers it was announced that report meetings would be held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 7:30 o'clock at St. Francis de Sales. The final report meeting will be held on next Sunday afternoon, Aug. 1.

Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, general chairman of the campaign, besides adding to the instructions to the workers gave a very inspiring talk on the subject of the campaign.

"During the coming week," he said, "you will be called upon by solicitors who will ask you to contribute to a rebuilding fund for De Sales High School. I ask that you receive these people graciously. They are doing a difficult work and your kind reception can make their work somewhat easier. Secondly, we ask you to be as generous as you possibly can. This is the biggest undertaking for the Church in Geneva in many years. It can succeed only if you extend yourself in generosity. If you have much, give much; if you have little, give little. Whatever you give, give it for the honor and glory of God and the good of this very worthy cause."

St. Hyacinth Boy Killed In Pacific, Parents Learn

AUBURN—Another of St. Hyacinth's boys has given his life for his country. A telegram from the adjutant general at Washington, D. C., brought to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph D. Dziurzynski of 50 Pulaski Street, Auburn, word that their son, Sgt. Theodore J. Dziurzynski, 20, technician third grade, had been killed in action in the Pacific area on July 18. The message conveyed the sympathy of the adjutant general.

Sgt. Dziurzynski was born in Auburn on April 28, 1923. He attended East High School and was a communicant of St. Hyacinth's Church and a member of the Polish Falcons. On May 29, 1941, he enlisted in the U. S. Army and was sent to Hawaii for duty. Last November, he was transferred to the Solomon Islands, the theater of force fighting with the Japanese. Two months ago he was promoted to the rank he held when he was killed.

Sgt. Dziurzynski is survived by his parents; a brother, Stanley, and three sisters, Boleslawa, Jane and Lottie. The parents of the young soldier received a letter from him about ten days ago which stated that he was well and in which he asked that he be sent some articles from home. The package containing the desired articles was sent.

REDEMPTORISTS MARK CENTENARY IN ENGLAND

LONDON.—(NC)—The Redemptorist Fathers celebrated on June 18 the centenary of their arrival in England when three priests and one lay brother set up their first house at Falmouth, Cornwall. The English Province was responsible for the establishing of Provinces in Ireland and Australia. Today in England there are 100 priests of the community and about 50 lay brothers in eight centers. Two more houses are in South Africa which comes under the English Province. About 25 of the priests are serving in the Forces as chaplains.
