REDEMPTORISTS MARK CENTENARY IN ENGLAND

LONDON. (NC)—The Redemptorist Fathers celebrated on June 18 the centenary of their arrival in England when three priests and one lay brother set up their first house at Falmouth, Cornwall. The English Province was responsible for the establishing of Provinces in Ireland and Australia. Today in England there are 100 priests of the community and about 50 lay brothers in eight centers. Two more houses are in South Africa which comes under the English Province. About 25 of the priests are serving in the Forces as chaplains.
