

Polish Children, 14 Forced To Work

NEW YORK—Polish children—tens of thousands of them—were being used and taken to forced labor in Nazi Germany, according to information received here by the Polish Catholic Press Agency (KAP).

Underground information from Poland, KAP says, reveals that these children are taken by force from their homes, from the

streets, from churches. In a church in Lublin, where after boys were regularly in the basement and secretly served Mass, the Gestapo appeared suddenly, say KAP. The action, who refused to surrender the boys, was slain. The pastor was arrested and his curia beaten and left for dead. The boys were herded into trucks and taken away.

Critical Metals Saved by NHA Plan

Savings ranging up to 30 percent in use of critical metals are compared with pre-war levels have been accomplished in the war housing construction program through joint cooperation of the government and the building industry. J. H. Blandford, Jr., Administrator of the National Housing Agency, said today.

Studies recently completed by the National Housing Agency show that the average privately financed family dwelling unit now being built under the war housing program consumes only 270 pounds of critical metals as compared with 830 pounds of such materials used in the average pre-war dwelling unit, a reduction of 67 percent. Mr. Blandford reported.

These statistics include not only the metals used directly in house building but also the metals consumed in products and equipment installed in the housing and in related utility facilities such as electric, gas, water and sewage connections.

Under the NHA's war housing programming policy, privately financed construction is scheduled wherever a post-war demand for the housing is reasonably likely and wherever private builders can meet necessary wartime requirements. Mr. Blandford pointed out. As privately financed war housing is therefore intended for long-term use, substitutions for metal items cannot be made on the same scale as in temporary structures intended only for wartime use, he said.

Because of the great wartime demands upon the available supplies of critical materials, the National Housing Agency authorizes new housing only where it is urgently required for war production." Mr. Blandford said.

This policy means that we have scheduled construction only to house essential in-migrant war workers and then only to the extent that those workers cannot be adequately housed in existing dwellings or through conversions of existing structures.

"Over and above this policy, however, the war effort has dictated that even the most essential war housing use absolutely minimum amounts of the materials needed for ships, planes, guns and tanks. The NHA has therefore worked closely with industry and with other governmental agencies to eliminate every unnecessary use of metal of housing construction and wherever possible to develop substitutes for the most critical items."
