Dr. Cronin Stresses Virtues Needed By World Today

NEW YORK (NC) — Focusing attention on five virtues which are needed by the world today, the Rev. John F. Cronin, SS., Director of the Institute of Catholic Social Studies at the Catholic University of America, Studies evening opened a series of five discourses on the Catholic Hour radio program, which is produced by the National Council of Catholic Men and is carried on the country-wide network of the National Broadcasting "like portraying our giornous vice tory in Sicily by talling only of a Company.

"There are two virtues which should be the pillars of society, justice and charity," Father Cremin declared, "With these as our support, a noble structure can be built. Without them, we build upon shifting saids." shifting sands.

Weaving his opening address about the strength in justice, Father Cronin explained that is subsequent discourses he would doul with "the forgotten virtue of hu-mility"; then with "charity, or love of neighbor, and then with that higher charity which men call patriotisms," and finally with the highest degree of justice and charity—worship, man's duty to his Maker.
