Solemn Vespers were sung by the St. Cecilia Choir under the direction of Prof. Frank Cleary, blessing of the church and sermon by Very Rev. Provincial L. Cymon, O.M.C.; solemn Benediction, special prayers for the parish boys in the service and for the deceased members of the parish, and the usual choral singing of the Polish religious anthem "God Who through the centuries, Blessed Poland With a Bless of Peace and Glory." Many Franciscan Fathers and local clergy participated in the ceremonies.

The church was previously painted by K. W. Vosburg of Auburn in the fall of 1927. The present decorations fall in harmony with the architecture of the church. Romanesque throughout the stone affect about the windows and presbytery give the interior a touch of the medieval and a certain illusive spaciousness. The ceiling is especially outstanding for its beautiful blend of light and soft, pastel; a fine piece of work on a steel ceiling. The walls of the church are of a darker hue offsetting the Stations of the Cross and the murals above the windows. The wainscoting is finished in paneled Spanish leather tiffany glass.

The sanctuary is a study in itself. The tapestries about the high and side altars blend with the paintings above and stenciling. The large mural above the main altar of St. Hyacinth in Glory, the angels on the facade of the sanctuary walls, and the Holy Eucharist above the windows, the Angel Dei the Polish Eagle and the Franciscan Coat-of-Arms are all done in oils on canvas by the famous international muralist, Prof. Vincenzo Mondo of New Haven, Conn.

The entire work of redecorating is indeed a revelation to the parishioners and to those who have thus far visited the church.

Special attention was paid to the remodeling and redecoration of the main altar, side altars, pulpit and communion rail. All are finished in white marble and onyx. Credit is due William Twaryg and his men from Holyoke, Mass., who did the special decorating while local help was used for the basic work. These men are well-known in the East and have beautiful church jobs to their credit.
