(Continued from Page 3) News, to speak, for domestic news about our prosecution of the war, but as regards foreign propaganda, it is in a very real sense our contact with the peoples of other nations. It is, in a way, a projection of the United States over the other waves and through other media, to the farthest corners of the earth.

No one wants to deny, observers say, that OWI, including its foreign broadcast section, can do a valuable and necessary job in the prosecution of the war. But, if it is to do this, they contend, its broadcasts to other countries must be a reflection of American thought and the American position on a given point—not the personal, and sometimes bitter, opinion of an individual employe, or group of employes.

It is a ridiculous situation, it is pointed out, for our diplomats and military to be working in close harmony toward a given end, only to have an individual, or a clique, cut straight across the whole effort by giving high-powered exposition to a personal opinion, and at the Government's expense.

There are those in Washington who fear that, if a lack of supervision should permit the recurrence, or continuance, of the Italian broadcast behavior, persons within the foreign section of the OWI may feel free to use it for personal and even party ends that are not always American. In other words, they say, it could be—in view of what has happened—that some OWI material represents the opinion and perhaps the malice of small groups rather than a sincere effort to put forward the cause of the United States.

Social Injustice Called Bar To Peace

SANTIAGO, Chile (NC) — The concern of His Holiness Pope Pius XII for "the economic status of the workers" was stressed by the Most Rev. Jose M. Caro, Archbishop of Santiago, in his sermon at the Te Deum ceremonies arranged by Catholic Action and the Catholic University on the "Day of the Pope."

There can be no true and lasting international peace, Archbishop Caro said, until social injustice, the obstacle to internal peace, has been removed.

His Excellency the Most Rev. Maurilio Silvani, Papal Nuncio to Chile, spoke briefly on the universal apostasy which, he said, has been unequalled in history.

"The entire universe," the Nuncio added, "is suffering from an agony for which there is no human remedy. Let individuals and peoples return to Christ, conforming their lives, privately and publicly, to the teachings of the Pope; and then peace will shine through, dispelling the present dense clouds on the international horizon."

Medical Mission Nuns To Train Nurses At New Hospital In India

PHILADELPHIA (NC) — As a means of relieving, to some extent, the vast shortage of trained nurses in India, the Medical Mission Sisters have decided to construct a 200-bed hospital in Rawalpindi, India, to replace the now inadequate 60-bed structure there. Mother Dr. Anna Dengel, Superior General of the community, has announced at the Motherhouse here.

Mother Dengel said the shortage of nurses in India is reflected in a survey made by the Nursing Journal of India, which stated there are only 7,000 trained nurses in the entire country of 400,000,000 persons.

At the All-India Catholic Congress, held in Myslapore, India, the Very Rev. Mgr. Joseph C. Panjikaran, of Kanyakulam, in an address on the Catholic medical missions in India, pointed out that there are less than 50 Catholic hospitals in India and Ceylon. He declared the average is 29.6 beds for each hospital and said the hospital with the largest number of beds is St. Martha's Hospital at Bangalore, where there are 150 beds. Monsignor Panjikaran continued:

"I mention these facts because the question of a training center is very important. And at present I find no well-equipped hospital to give a good training course in nursing. For good training cannot be given to the pupil nurses unless the hospital has at least 200 beds, efficient and able doctors and other facilities. None of our present hospitals satisfy these conditions."

At the same Congress, the Most Rev. Leandro Guido LeFlock, Bishop of Ajmer, declared that in any consideration of the training of nurses, the Holy Family Hospital at Rawalpindi, operated by the Medical Mission Sisters, deserved a "place of honor." He recalled that nuns of three communities were trained at the hospital, which is the one that will be replaced by the 200-bed structure.

CORRESPONDENCE RELIGION COURSES NET 60 CONVERTS

DENVER — Religion classes by correspondence conducted throughout Colorado by the Sisters of Loreto, at Loreto Heights College, here, during the last five years have brought 60 converts into the church. It was announced here by the Rev. Gregory Smith, Archdiocesan Director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, who directs the work.
