Funeral services were held in the chapel of the Convent of Our Lady of Mercy, with the Most Reverend John J. Russell, D. D., Bishop of Charleston, offering the Pontifical Mass of Requiem.

For many years she devoted her time to children at the Orphan Home, and taught at St. Angela Academy, Aiken, and St. Joseph's Academy, Sumter. For a few years she was in charge of Our Lady of Mercy School in Charleston, and for several years was sacristan at the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist.

Sister Clare is survived by a sister, Sister Mary Angela, with whom she entered the convent in Charleston, forty-five years ago.


