Polish Widow, 106, World's Oldest DP, Starts Life Anew in U. S.

 NEW YORK—Now that she's put an ocean between herself and the Russians, Mrs. Pauline Wilsdorf, Polish refugee who celebrated her 106th birthday on July 7, feels a bit more secure.

A plane flight across the Atlantic from Germany and the hustle-and-bustle of the "big town" apparently didn't faze the astounding Mrs. Wilsdorf, whose dislike for the Russians made her widely known as the world's oldest displaced person.

Accompanied by her son, Julian; his wife, Matrons, and their adopted daughter, Elzaveta, Mrs. Wilsdorf landed at Idlewild International Airport, with 60 other displaced persons. The plane was four hours late because of bad weather over Newfoundland, a six-hour delay which had telling effects on a number of the passengers, but not Mrs. Wilsdorf.

She was met at the airport by officials of War Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference, which brought the Wilsdorf family to this country. With a serenity and gaiety that seemed to belie her 106 years, Mrs. Wilsdorf walked from the plane to a waiting automobile so briskly that her son and his family hurried to keep up with her.

Mrs. Edward E. Swanson, executive director of WRS—N. C. W. C., disclosed that the sponsor of the Wilsdorf family is the Rev. Alexander Steranka of Buffalo, who is responsible for resettling more than 150 DP families in New York State. Father Steranka found the Wilsdorfs a home and jobs on a farm near Buffalo. Mrs. Wilsdorf said she expects to cook, keep house and tend her adopted granddaughter while her son and his wife work on the farm.

After a brief sightseeing trip, Mrs. Wilsdorf rested for a while at a hotel and told reporters she regretted that she had not come to this country 50 years sooner. She said she thought New York was "a nice place to live" and was impressed particularly with the Empire State Building, which she said looked like "a great, big church."

The Wilsdorfs lived on a farm in a section of eastern Poland which now has been grabbed up by the Russians. When World War II broke, the Wilsdorfs and their neighbors went through cruel, grim days under Russian occupation. When Germany went to war against Russia, the Nazis took over the territory. While the family was slave-laboring for the Germans, Mr. Wilsdorf died at the age of 106. Then, in when the Russians began pushing the Germans out of Poland, the word went around that the Soviets were coming back. That's when Mrs. Wilsdorf left Poland.

She and her son gathered a few of their belongings and on foot, by ox-cart and train travelled to Austria, where they accepted the hardships of life as DP's rather than experience again the tyrannies of Soviet domination.

Mrs. Wilsdorf made several radio broadcasts, including one for the Voice of America, and saw the sights of the city for several days before leaving for the Buffalo farm.

She is survived by her husband; a daughter, Mrs. S. P. Sorrells, of Tampa; a son, Louis Griffin, Jr., of Macon; a brother, Joseph W. Trommerhauser, of Rome; a aunt, Miss Cecelia Trommerhauser, Augusta, and two grandchildren, Cecil Griffin and Teresa Griffin, both of Macon.
