Jewish Soldier Lauds Work Of Priest-Chaplain

CLEVELAND — Writing from a South Pacific war area base, a Jewish soldier, Capt. Norman R. Bergman, in a letter to his brother, Robert Lee Bergman, lauded the Rev. Paul J. Hallinan, former assistant pastor of St. Alexander's Church here and now a chaplain in the Army chaplain corps as "God's Messenger to us." The soldier wrote:

"As a Jew, I want all Cleveland Jews to know that Father Hallinan, who is from Cleveland, made it possible for us to hold our traditional Passover services here in this area under the most trying conditions. We held the official seder for two nights and it was beautiful. This is only one of the things Father Hallinan has done for our small group. He organized Jewish services on our transport coming across."

Capt. Bergman continues his praise of Father Hallinan, saying "he is the best friend any man in the service could have" and related that the men in his regiment built for the priest a beautiful chapel at their camp, under his supervision.

"Men of all faiths and from all walks of life can be seen stepping in and out of our chapel for a short prayer during the day. Catholic, Jew and Protestant, we all love and respect Father Hallinan," the Corporal wrote.
