Lithuanian Prelate Reported Arrested

VATICAN CITY - The Most Rev. Joseph Skvirczek, Bishop of Kaunas in Lithuania, has been arrested allegedly for refusing to support the formation of a Lithuanian Legion to fight against Soviet Russia, according to the Ecumenical Service, a Protestant news agency in Switzerland.

Bishop Skvirczek is more than 70 years of age. Lithuania is some 30 per cent Catholic in its population. A number of Lithuanian government officials are reported to have been arrested for the same reason as that assigned in the Bishop's detention.
