### GLAD TO GIVE IT

One thing that interferes with my happiness is the fact that it is hard to rent a home or an apartment for a large family of nine children. When I have tried to rent rooms, the first thing I was asked was: "How many children have you?" And when I tell the landlord nine, he refuses to rent me his rooms. In the end we wind up in some tenement house on the third floor—and we're glad to get it at that.

For the past few years I have been trying to get a farm, for I think that a large family can get along much better out in the country. Much of our time at home is spent planning a farm home, that is one that is located near a Catholic church and school. I wonder if there is any way possible to obtain such a farm. I have inquired at various real estate offices, but the down payment is always too much or the church and school are too far. Is there any Catholic business man or real estate man who would let me pay off a farm as rent, plus reasonable interest? I know we could make a success of it.

I find it hard to put on paper what I want to say, but I hope you can make this out.
