JONESTOWN, Miss.—Members of the Women's Club of this community were impressed deeply by an exhibit of a home shrine arranged at a club meeting at which the Rev. John Martin, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, was the principal speaker. The shrine was arranged at the meeting place by Mrs. John Hill Hood, who is a consultant on the committee on Shrines in the Home of the National Council of Catholic Women. In a letter to the council, Mrs. Hood stated:

"At a recent meeting of the Women's Club of Jonestown I was asked to conduct the program. I selected as my topic, 'Spirituality in Defense.' Our pastor, Father Martin, was the speaker. He and I were the only Catholics present.

Asks Merchant Mariners Be Included In Prayers

NEW YORK.—An appeal for the inclusion of the men of the Merchant Marine in the "very laudable custom of offering prayers for the spiritual and temporal welfare of the men in the armed forces" was made by the Rev. Leo W. Madden, Lieutenant Commander and chief of chaplains of the U. S. Maritime Service, in a letter to the Most Rev. John F. O'Hara, O.S.C., Military Delegate.

Father Madden's letter pointed out that the Merchant Marine is not an armed force, but a civilian one, despite the fact that it is making a vital contribution to the war effort and its loss of life proportionately is higher than that of any of the other services.

"There are many, of course," he wrote, "particularly those with loved ones in the Merchant Marine, who know that we are not members of the armed forces. They feel that their relatives, and friends are not included in these public prayers. This fact has been called to our attention and we are writing to solicit the support of the organizations you represent to include specifically the Merchant Marine in your prayers. Some form such as: 'We will now offer a prayer for the welfare of our loved ones in the Army, Navy and Merchant Marine' would suit our purpose admirably and would serve to let all know that we have not been forgotten."
