

Madonna of Highway Shrine Dedication Sept. 12

Formal plans for the solemn dedication of the "Madonna of the Highways" shrine at Old St. Mary's Church include blessing by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney and sermon by Rev. Magr. Fulton J. Sheen of the Catholic University of America.

Dedicatory services for the new shrine will take place on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 12, according to arrangements of the Rev. George F. Kettell, R.T.D., pastor of Old St. Mary's.

The shrine was erected in January, 1942, on the site of the former residence of St. Mary's Church, South Street. At next month's ceremony a plaque now being built inscribed with 145 names of St. Mary's parishioners in service, also will be dedicated.

Weather permitting, the complete dedication service and Monsignor Sheen's address will take place outdoors.

Anticipating a large crowd that may fill Washington Square across from the new shrine, Doctor Kettell has arranged for public address system and the closing of South Street during the ceremony. Monsignor Sheen's sermon will also be broadcast by radio station WHAM.

Members of the American Legion will participate in the ceremony. Civic leaders and resident army and navy officials also will be invited to attend. The interpretation of the shrine's title is "Mary, protect us on our way" and Doctor Kettell explains that the shrine

will be dedicated with that intention for this war's servicemen.

Sacred Heart Academy Opens In Its Eighty-Ninth Year

With the reopening of classes on September 13, the Academy of the Sacred Heart, 8 Prince Street, will begin its eighty-ninth scholastic year. The Academy has grown from

the central private home of its beginning to an extensive building including Chapel, classroom wing, dormitory and other necessary adjuncts. A separate gymnasium building was completed in 1931.

On Tuesday, Sept. 14, His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, will celebrate the Mass of the Holy Ghost in the school chapel. The entire student body will attend.

The Academy of the Sacred Heart is one of an international group of schools under the direction of the Religious of the Sacred Heart, founded in Paris in 1800 by St. Madeline Sophie Barat. The educational principles and cultural aims are alike throughout the group, while the curricula and other regulations are adapted to the several environments in which the individual schools are located. The school includes Kindergarten, Primary Grades and High School.

The faculty for the coming year includes graduates from the Catholic University of America, Fordham University, the University of Rochester, Manhattanville College of the Sacred Heart, Columbia University School of Library Science, New York State School for Teachers, Albany, N. Y.; Department of Librarianship, Eastman School of Music, and Mechanics Institute.

Faculty Increased, Courses Added At Nazareth Academy

number of registrations has been taken which has necessitated an increase in the number of teachers.

The academy, located at 100 Lake Avenue, under the direction of the Sisters of St. Joseph, offers an excellent opportunity to girls who wish to make their high school years count most toward their future success.

During the summer months some members of the faculty extended their studies in higher mathematics, business and the dramatics; others have taken courses in radio and aeronautics.

This included ground school work, model building, and the elements of aerodynamics, with the greatest stress placed upon the

social aspect of the impending air-age.

These courses will be adapted to the school curriculum which is planned to meet the requirements of the New York State Board of Education. In this way the pupils will be better equipped to meet the new demands of scholastic, business and industrial needs in both war and post-war times.

Nazareth Academy offers courses in Religion and English; the Romance languages and German; Mathematics; the sciences, including General Science, Biology, Physics and Chemistry; Home Economics; History; Music; Speech; Art; Journalism; Business and Secretarial work, and Physical Education.

Full 4-Year Term To Open At St. Agnes High School

St. Agnes High School announces the opening of its fourth academic year on Tuesday, Sept. 7, and the graduating of its first academic class for next June.

The immediate provision for the extended curriculum includes more ample library accommodation and equipment with pleasant reading rooms, under the direction of a trained and experienced Sister Librarian.

Another feature in preparation is the new chemical laboratory and class room, both with excellent and adequate equipment.

The department of social science is likewise being extended to meet the needs of the new social studies program and another pleasant

room is being equipped for this growing department.

Located centrally in Rochester on 276 Main Street East—St. Agnes School for resident and day students, includes the night grammar grades and a pre-school, besides the four years of high school.
