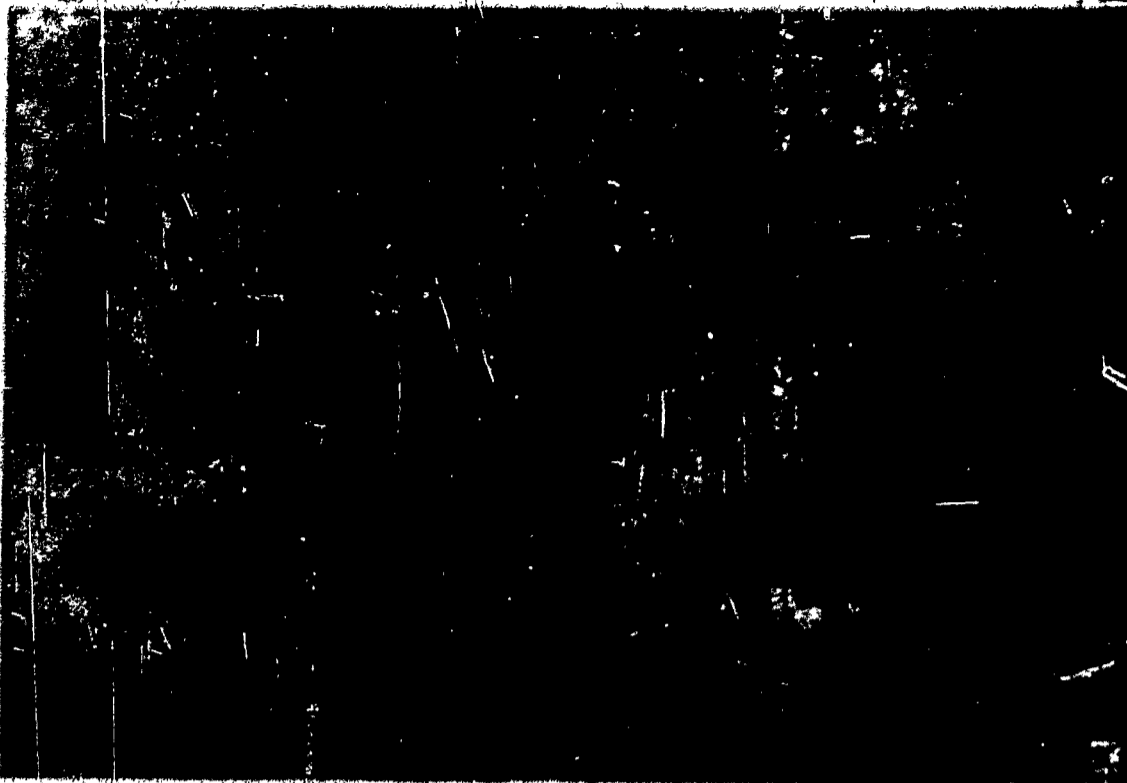


PLAN IN AID OF CATHOLIC SOCIAL WORK



The campaign of the National Catholic School of Social Service, Washington, D. C., to insure and increase the supply of trained Catholic social workers in the post-war era was given great impetus at a meeting of distinguished Catholic women first held in San Francisco. The San Francisco Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women pledged itself to sell a quota of \$5,000 of the 1,000,000 twenty-cent War Saving Stamps which are to be sold as part of this campaign. Catholic Heroes

Commando, Minus Leg, Visits Orphanage

DUROQUE — As a War hero and aviator for Uncle Sam, Private Vernon Eagle of the U. S. Army, who lost his left leg above the knee in the North African wars, has come back home. He lived here for about ten years up until 1931 and is visiting the Rev. John A. Theobald, chaplain of St. Mary's Orphan Home, which once was home for Private Eagle. Private Eagle lost his leg while serving with a Commando unit of the British Army. He took part in nine major engagements and received the British Military Medal, the Silver Star and the Purple Heart decorations. Despite the loss of his leg, Private Eagle will continue in Army service at Fort George Meade, Md., attached to the military intelligence department.

Boston College Alumnus Decorated

BOSTON — The Silver Star Medal for heroism in action has been awarded to First Lieut. John Bernard Dwyer, U. S. Marine Corps, of Stanford, Conn., an alumnus of Boston College, by Admiral William F. Halsey, U. S. Navy commander-in-chief of the South Pacific war theater, according to advice received here. Citation of Lieut. Dwyer's decoration related that he carried out an offensive task while in charge of a platoon of Marines under such heavy mortar fire that a wounded man he was trying to carry back to safety was killed in his hands. He was credited with saving three wounded companions while on the mission. The action occurred on Guadalcanal.

Urges Mexico Pastors To Aid Conscription

MEXICO CITY (MC) — The Most Rev. Jose Rivera y Carlin, Archbishop of Guadalajara, has issued an instruction to all pastors calling for their cooperation with the authorities in the conscription of youths of military age. The instruction also states that no conscription is to be admitted to the preparatory seminary until their military service status has been ascertained.

Samaritan Israelites Build New Temple; Less Than 300 Left

JERUSALEM — The oldest Christian congregation, Samaritan, near Nablus (ancient Samaria) having chosen a new high-priest, they have decided to build a new synagogue, with some outside help, for the less than 300 remaining members of that ancient sect. The Samaritans profess to observe the original Mosaic law, and claim never to have left the soil of Palestine, even at the time of the Jewish exile.

St. Louis U. Alumnus Gets Silver Star

ST. LOUIS — Maj. Mark T. Martin, Jr., who was President of the Student Council when he graduated from St. Louis University in 1926 and now is serving overseas with the Army, has been awarded the Silver Star decoration for extraordinary leadership and gallantry in action in the Tinsian campaign, according to advices received at the university.

Urges Mexico Pastors To Aid Conscription

"All of us," Archbishop Rivera y Carlin writes, "have a country which by the loss of youth and by virtue of poverty we must love and for which we must give our sacrifice ourselves. Jesus Christ, Our Lord, loved His country. He went over His sufferings and had the sweet satisfaction of performing miracles and prodigies among the Jews of Israel. Let us, imitating His example, love our Country. In addition to the general duty of loving our Country, we have the Christian duty of giving our cooperation for the general good, in the knowledge that it corresponds to the authority which is responsible for leading us along the path that is proper, to indicate the manner in which the general good is to be served."

Postage Rates To U.S. Boosted in Palestine

JERUSALEM — (MC) — Rates of postage to the United States and other foreign countries have been increased here for the first time in many years. Letters to America now cost 20 mils instead of 15, while (non-picture) post-cards may be sent for 12 mils, with printed matter rates about doubled. A Palestine mail is the thirteenth part of a pound, and is worth 5 cent at normal exchange rates.

Former Athlete Slain in Pacific Area

WASHINGTON — First Lieut. John R. Corbett, of the U. S. Marine Corps, former outstanding athlete and civil engineering school student at the Catholic University of America here, has been killed in action in the Pacific war theater, according to advices received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John T. Corbett.
