

## Adoration Men To Keep Nocturnal Vigil Saturday

AUBURN—The Nocturnal Adoration Society of Auburn will hold its devotion next Saturday, August 26, from 8:00 until 12:00 o'clock in St. Mary's Church. This devotion was established in honor of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. It has spread very rapidly in the past ten years and is now practiced throughout the entire country.

In the Rochester Diocese it is held on the last Saturday night of each month. Originally the devotion was held from 8:00 until 6:00 o'clock the following morning but because of the difficulties induced by war conditions the devotion is now held from 8:00 until mid-night.

The devotion is a very beautiful one. At the beginning the Blessed Sacrament is exposed above the Tabernacle and remains there during the four hours of the devotion. One of the priests recites the opening prayers after the Exposition. Then the men themselves take charge. The leaders and members of the society concur together the vocal prayers which consume about one-half of the hour and the remainder is spent in private devotion. The society is divided into bands with each band watching one hour. The changes in bands is made at the beginning of each hour. In this way the Catholic men of Auburn have one night each month consecrated to Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. Our Lord is watching in the Tabernacle all the day and all the nights.

Men of Auburn not affiliated with this Society are asked to go to become members and spend one hour with Our Lord asking that peace may come to the world. Father O'Connell, a former Auburn assistant, said in a recent address to the First Friday Club of Rock, eaters: "Let's put our hearts and souls into one plea for sinners. Then victory and peace will be ours and the boys will come home sooner."

VATICAN CITY (N.C.) — The fourth volume of "Discourses and Radio Addresses of His Holiness Pope Pius XII" — corresponding to the fourth year of his Pontificate — has been released by the Vita e Pensiero publishing house. The 488-page volume contains 43 discourses and five radio addresses made between March 2, 1942, and March 1, 1943.

Among the discourses contained in the fourth volume is the series of Papal addresses to newlyweds which constitute a treatise on the Christian family.
