Cites Duty To Improve Condition Of Workers

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica.—"Our duty as representatives of Christ is to raise the level of the life of the workers, manually and intellectually," the Most Rev. Victor Sanabria, Archbishop of San Jose, said in his address at the First National Assembly of the Catholic Labor Organizations of Costa Rica. The assembly, which was held in honor of His Holiness Pope Pius XII, was described by El Escondido, organ of the Catholic Labor Youth, as "the official proclamation of our organizations which, until now, have worked almost in humble silence."

Archbishop Sanabria spoke of the social plan outlined in his Pastoral of three years ago and which is now under way. Appealing to the "workers here assembled," he said: "I ask you, soldiers of labor, in the Name of Christ, to assume the part corresponding to you in this social evolution of our epoch; and at the same time, I invite you to form Catholic syndicates the better to carry out the improvement of your cultural and economic situation."

Jive Has Its Place Avers Music Educator

"All types of music have their place in the American scheme of things, even jive," said Harry W. Seitz, president of the National Catholic Music Educators Association, while in Cleveland last week to attend the organization meeting of the Ohio Chapter of the Association.

"This jiving music has its place," he said, "in furnishing some youth a means of emotional expression. If they must express themselves, it's better to do so by living than by other ways."

'Catholic Shelf' In Public Library Offers 'Apostolate'

The fact that Catholics as well as non-Catholics patronize public libraries, writes the Rev. Nicholas Steffen in the September issue of THE ECCLESIASTICAL REVIEW, suggests "an apostolate which could be promoted to advantage."

Seeking for a plan to make the heritage of Catholic literature readily available to all citizens, both Catholic and non-Catholic, Father Steffen recalls a plan worked out in the public library of Dubuque, Iowa. The plan, he explains, is to display Catholic books on a special reserve shelf to be known as "The Catholic Shelf."

The procedure to be followed in establishing "The Catholic Shelf" in public libraries is outlined by Father Steffen as follows:

First, it is recommended that the priest inform himself regarding the number of Catholic books already catalogued in the library, and regarding the average circulation of all religious books. Books placed on a "Catholic Shelf" have been found by actual record to have a circulation from three to five times that of Catholic books assigned to regular stacks.

Second, a definite plan for the maintenance of the "Shelf" should be worked out. Many libraries are willing to purchase desired Catholic books out of their regular budgets. When libraries lack funds, parish societies, Knights of Columbus, and others might offer books as gifts to the library.

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
