We feel we must share with all our N.C.C.W. members a letter received from the Rev. Lillian E. Lauerman, Director of the National Catholic School of Social Service, who writes:

An auspicious start has been made toward a truly magnificent goal. We believe that the Campaign will go over the top, simply because the Catholic women will not fail their Church or nation at this time of real need. The strongest reason, however, is that we realize the great need of our work in the present campaign. The far-reaching effects of this campaign open up an as yet unexplored field for the beginning of the school. When we collect a penny or a dime or a larger special gift we are doing more than just that. We are really gathering material out of which messengers of charity and morality will be built—we are creating the right instruments for a better social order.

A North Dakota pastor sent a contribution the other day. His parish is small—German-Russian. It is rather difficult to get our people to realize the need of some of these things such as social service. . . I fear the time . . . when our own people will fall victims of the so-called social workers. He says that the families in the parish consist of eight to ten children. We know what he meant and he looks to the Council and the School to help him ward off the influence that will deal off the good he and many sacrificing priests like him have given their lives to build up. So a stamp isn't just a stamp, it is a means to an end—to the education of Catholic social workers who will protect and further the home, the family, and Catholic life.

The greatness of your work at N.C.C.W. is known full to God alone. Oh, it dare not fail because not only bodies but souls are at stake.

Let us pray for success with great confidence. The Virgin Mary was the first social worker of the Christian era. She aided a soul-hungry world by giving it a Life and a Light. The Feast of the Assumption symbolizes the victory and reward of service to our Father. May she guide us onward to our million goal and may the Queen of Victory bless every one of you who are getting stamps and turning them into bonds of love to God and your neighbor.

THE RACE TO HEAVEN

A novel method of teaching Catholic Faith, as carried on in the mission field, is reported in The Catholic Transcript of Hartford, as follows:

One of our missionaries has devised a means of making "the race to heaven" more interesting and more exciting. He informs us that "a beautiful little statue of the Child Jesus holds the place of honor high up on the classroom wall. A table is placed beneath and an 'imposing staircase' (of colored bamboo sticks) is built up from the table to the statue. The steps are very wide at the bottom to allow room for the jostling crowd of youngsters who begin their climb to heaven; but gradually it narrows until there is just room for one person at the top.

Thus do the little brown and black angels begin their ascent. Attendance at daily Mass is the requisite for a place of honor on that coveted top step. Entwined around the hand of the statue of the Infant Jesus is a beautiful little rosary which is the prize which will be given to the first child to reach the top step in "his race to heaven."
