HAVANA. Religion is the best ally of patriotism in Uruguay, the Cuban Minister to that Republic, Nicolas Rivera y Alonso, wrote in a letter to Dr. Francisco Ferran Alvarez, Catholic news editor for the Havana daily, *Diario de la Marina*.

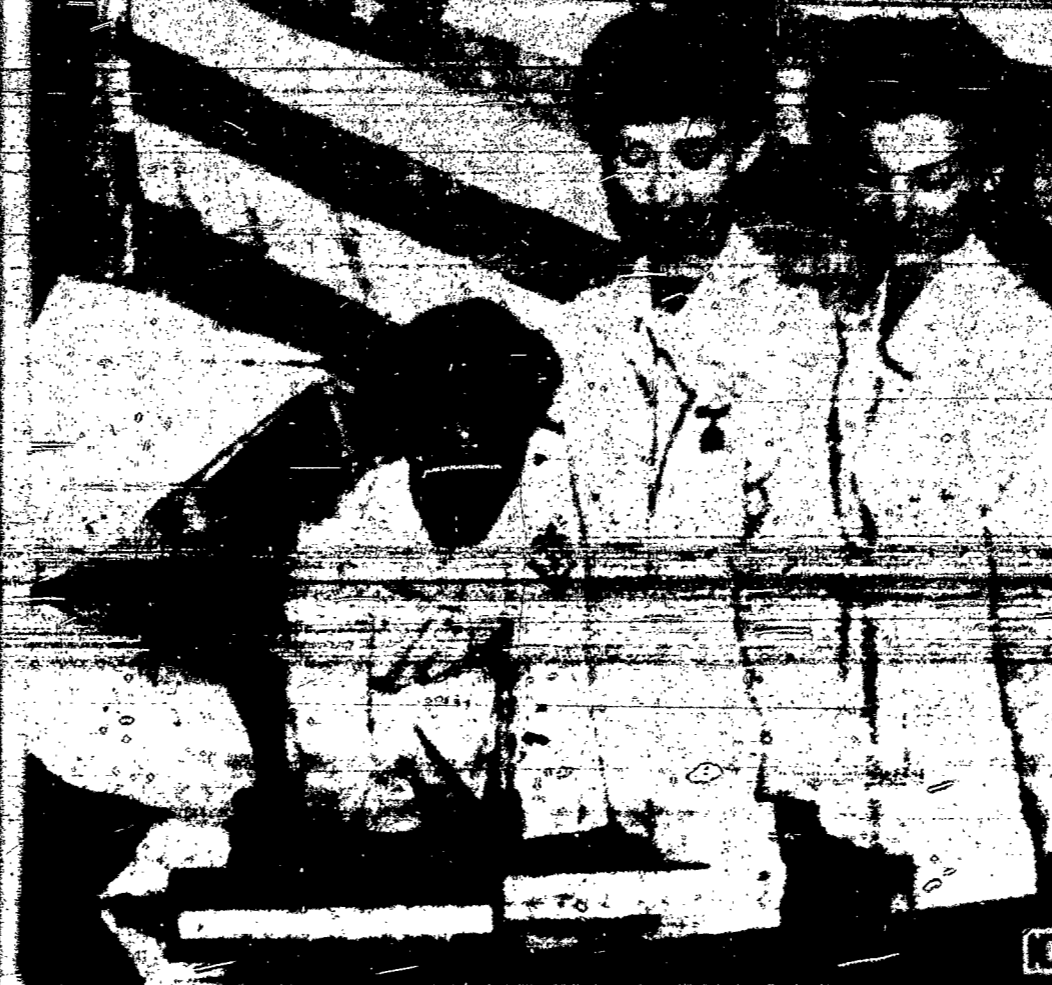
"When I came here," the Minister wrote from Montevideo, "I thought that this country had lost every vestige of the faith which Jesuit missionaries inculcated in the peoples of South America during the sixteenth century. Fortunately I was mistaken. I have seen few nations more conscious of their faith than Uruguay. Catholic Action is amazingly effective. Not a child goes without the bread of catechetical instruction provided in every parish. Here religion is the best ally of patriotism."

AUBURN. Rev. Edwin Agonis, O.F.M., was a visitor in Auburn during the past week. Father Edwin, a member of the Franciscan Order, was an altar boy at St. Mary's Church in Auburn for a year and is a member of the order of priests in charge of St. Hyacinth's Parish in Auburn.

Since leaving Auburn, he has been an assistant in Williamsport, Pa., and Lawrence, Mass. During the past week he was appointed a professor at Grand Seminary in Massachusetts. Father Edwin was ordained on July 8, 1941, and was assigned for the priesthood in America, Canada and abroad. Father Edwin, who was abroad when war was declared, spoke frequently to various organizations in Auburn while he was stationed at St. Mary's and his lectures on conditions abroad were very informative.
