

St. Joan of Arc Nuns Get Second Post in Diocese

The Sisters of St. Joan of Arc obtained this week their second foundation in the Diocese of Rochester when they were officially intrusted with the domestic duties of the St. Andrew's Seminary Faculty House at 321 Lake Ave., Rochester.

Eleven years ago this present month of September, the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern welcomed the first group of St. Joan of Arc Sisters to Rochester, and assigned to them the domestic work of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Three On Staff

The new Institute being established at the St. Andrew's Faculty House will be staffed by three sisters. The Sisters of Joan of Arc devote themselves exclusively to the spiritual and temporal service of the priesthood.

The community was founded in this country in 1921 at Worcester, Mass., and around the Motherhouse is located in Bergerville in the vicinity of Quaker Hill.

Six years after its foundation, a decree of the Sacred Congregation of Ecclesiastics and the ecclesiastical approval of His Holiness, Pope Benedict XV, officially established the Joans of Arc Sisters among the approved religious communities of the church.

Each day of the Sisters' week is consecrated by prayer and labor to the priests' office. On Sunday their prayers and labors are consecrated to the intention of the Holy Father. Monday, their prayers and work are offered for the Cardinals and Bishops; Tuesday, for the Archbishops and Prelates; Wednesday, for deceased priests; Thursday, for souls in purgatory; Friday, for priests of religious communities, and Saturday, for seminarians.


SISTER AMABILIS RETIRES AS SUPERIOR OF LEO HOUSE

NEW YORK.—After six years as Superior at the Leo House, hospice for Catholic travelers here, Sister St. Amabilis will return to the motherhouse of her order at Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.

During her term as Superior, the Leo House was changed from an elegant home to a modern hospice for Catholic travelers and the mortgagor was considerably reduced. The Board of Directors requested that Sister Amabilis might be permitted to continue as Superior, but this is not possible according to the rules of the Order of St. Agnes.

A Dramatic Setting for Treasures

A shadow box cupboard will do the trick. The one shown here is light and substantial; will lend glamour even to dime store odds and ends, and may be placed on top of a table, a chest of drawers or a desk. No special skill and almost no tools are needed to make it.

If you do not have a saw to cut the scalloped frame, mark it on plywood and take it to the nearest woodworking shop to have it cut. You may have the straight boards cut at the lumber yard where you buy them. All you will have to do is screw them together, tack on the front frame and paint or stain to suit your room color scheme.

Rites Conducted For Sister of St. Joseph

Sister M. Clementine Harrington

Sister M. Clementine Harrington of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph, died Monday, Sept. 13, 1943, at Villa Marie, Weyland. She was born in Lima and became a Sister of St. Joseph in 1920. Sister taught in several of the parochial schools of the diocese, having taught for a number of years in Immaculate Conception School, Ithaca; St. Mary's School, Canandaigua; and St. Anthony's, Rochester.

Surviving is a sister, Miss Madeline Harrington.

Funeral services were held at Nazareth Convent, East Ave., on Wednesday morning, Sept. 13.

Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered by the Rev. John E. Macney, assisted by the Rev. Francis Crisantelli as Deacon and the Rev. Michael J. Tyding, Subdeacon. The Rev. Joseph H. Gefell was Master of Ceremonies.

In the Sanctuary were the Rev. William W. Hezel and the Rev. Louis Edelman.

Final blessing at the grave in the Sisters' plot at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery was imparted by Father Gefell, assisted by the Rev. Victor J. Hurley and Father Tyding.

MOTHER OF 2 SERVICEMEN, HERSELF NOTED PARACHUTE JUMPER, JOINS WACS

BROOKLYN.—Holder of the world's altitude parachute jumping record for women and mother of two sons in the armed service, Mrs. Marie McMillin, of St. Joan of Arc parish, Jackson Heights, N. Y., has entered the Women's Army Corps. She is in basic training at the Third WAC Training Center at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga.

Mrs. McMillin set her record at the International Air Races in Cleveland in 1932, jumping 24,800 feet. For the last 13 years she has been making parachute jumps at public events, having 260 jumps to her credit. She also has a private pilot's license, which she received in 1932.

One of her sons is with a parachute battalion of the Marines and another is training to become a bombardier. Mrs. McMillin is an active member of the Auxiliary of the Brooklyn Diocesan Convert Apostolate.

2 NCCS Field Workers Study For Priesthood

WASHINGTON.—Two members of the National Catholic Community Service field staff have left USO posts to study for the priesthood, it was announced today at NCCS National Headquarters here.

They are August M. Capburn, former assistant director at the Mobile USO club, who will enter the Mobile Diocesan Seminary, and Lawrence F. Lee, former assistant director at Highland Falls, N. Y., who will begin his seminary studies for the Galveston Diocese.

Nuns To Conduct Home For Poor

ERNAKULAM, India.—In conjunction with the celebration of the golden jubilee of the founding of the Carmelite Convent at Valkkom, the cornerstone of a Home for the Poor, which will be erected near the convent and will be conducted by the nuns, was laid and blessed by the Most Rev.
