### Holy Family Grammar School

AUBURN.—The 1943 school year was ushered in Tuesday, Sept. 7, with the children attending Mass, the Very Rev. Dean John A. Conway officiating.

An increase in registration is noted over last year. There are 218 boys and 182 girls, totaling 400, as compared with 381 of last year. Grades 6, 7 and 8 have the heaviest registration. There are 45 in Grade 1.

This increase of pupils has necessitated the purchase of new equipment, including new desks.

The rental system of books is being started this year. Eventually this will prove a boon in the purchase of books by the pupils.

#### Library Interests

With the opening of the fall term library books were drawn by the Eighth Grade pupils early in the week.

Now more than sixty books have been added including Religion, Biography, Fiction, Travel, Adventure and Books of Handicraft for boys. A new unabridged Webster-Merriman Dictionary and the latest edition of the Lincoln Library, 2-volume set, have also been purchased.

Six magazines have been subscribed for, plus a full subscription, numbering 52, of The Young Catholic Messenger. These periodicals will furnish ample means of keeping abreast with Current Events of Church and State.

An enrollment of the Grammar School and faculty members in the New York Library Association, is the gift of the Graduating class of 1943, as well as a set of Prose and Poetry containing the Literary Selections for the English Course. A full set for use in the Seventh Grade was also donated last June.

The Pamphlet Library numbers 170 copies. It is thoroughly enjoyed by the pupils and their parents. Slogans and Posters give an added impetus to the enthusiasm of the class to promote better reading among juveniles.

A survey of the various grade libraries will be made at a later date. Each teacher is deeply interested in advocating an interest in books for recreational and cultural development.

### Wins Easing Of Nazi Ban On Spiritual Aid To Polish

VATICAN CITY.—Some mitigation of restrictions which Nazi officials have put upon spiritual assistance to Polish workers in Germany has been obtained by the Most Rev. Konrad Grosber, Archbishop of Freiburg of Brisgau, according to KIPA, Swiss Catholic news agency.

It is reported that it is permitted to hear the confession of a Polish worker in danger of death, but that the previously existing absolute prohibition against the use of the Polish language in liturgical functions continues in force. What about the Poles who are unable to speak German? KIPA asks.

### Nuns Answer Call For Nurses In India

KARACHI, India.—Authorities of this city requested the nuns of the Congregation of Franciscan Missionaries of Christ the King to serve as nurses in the City Hospital and three nuns, Sisters Mercedes, Helen and Elizabeth, were named to fulfill the request as soon as it was made.

The hospital serves the poor of the city and its environs and its nursing staff has been hard-hit by the war emergency.

### Bombay Archbishop Named Military Delegate In India

BOMBAY, India.—Appointment of the Most Rev. Thomas Roberts, Archbishop of Bombay, as Military Delegate for the British forces in India, has been announced here. The appointment was made by the Most Rev. James Dwyer, Bishop-in-Ordinary to His Majesty's Forces in England.

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
