Declaration On Peace Studied At Central Verein Meet In Troy

Discussion of the peace program advanced by the Catholic Central Verein of America featured a successful regional meeting of the State Branch held jointly with the National Catholic Women's Union, State Branch, in Troy, last Sunday.

The joint session was held in St. Lawrence School Hall beginning at 2:00 p. m. Following the opening prayer by Rev. F. J. Buechler, Spiritual Advisor of the Men's Branch, Frank E. Popp, chairman of the local committee, welcomed those in attendance and turned the meeting over to Richard F. Hemmerlein, president of the State Branch, C.C.V.

Short expressions of greeting were made by Miss Laura K. Schilling of Rochester, President of the State Branch, N.C.W.U., and by Mrs. Mary Filler Lohr, president of the National Catholic Women's Union.

Judge Philip M. Donnelly of Rochester discussed the Declaration on Peace and Reconstruction adopted by the 1943 state and national conventions of the Catholic Central Verein. He briefly outlined the text of the declaration and then urged his audience to make the words of the declaration their own, so that they might be in a position to help form a sound public opinion on the principles which must underlie a peace that will endure.

A brief talk on parish credit unions by Joseph H. Gervais of Rochester evoked a lively question and answer period. As a result it is believed that credit unions may be started in several parishes in the eastern part of the state.

Father Buechler led a discussion on what can be done to interest youth in studying the social questions of the day. Several good suggestions were advanced.

The men's branch met in separate session to hear a talk by Albert J. Sattler of New York on the Central Verein's plan for revivifying the benevolent societies by having their death benefits reinsured with a legal reserve company.

The women's branch at the same time was addressed on the subject of modesty in dress.

At 4:45 p. m. those in attendance marched to St. Lawrence's Church, where a Eucharistic service was conducted by Father Buechler.
