"The Creed Explained" By Dr. Bäuerl Revised

A revised edition of The Creed Explained, by the Rev. Joseph J. Bäuerl, S.T.D., professor of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, N.Y., has just been published by the Catechetical Guild, St. Paul, Minnesota.

This new revision of Dr. Bäuerl's work is its fifth edition, based on Deharbe's and the revised Baltimore Catechism.

His presentation is according to the Munich, or psychological method, which does not begin with the abstract answer of the catechism but always with something sensible and concrete, an object lesson—in the form of a story from the Bible, Church History, the lives of the saints or an equivalent source. Out of this object lesson the catechetical concepts are evolved—then combined into the catechism text and formally applied to life.

A complete index, for the entire book and for the many illustrative anecdotes that ensure full coverage of each article of the Creed, facilitates classroom application of the method.

Father Bäuerl, according to his publishers, "does not aim at an ordinary faith; rather, he makes it a shining thing, intangible only in its immeasurability but capable of being grasped and held forever in the strength it imparts."

An author, educator and lecturer, the Rochester priest has labored continuously since his ordination in 1908 to promote more effective methods in religious instruction.

A pioneer in the catechetical field in this country, Father Bäuerl has produced several books for Catholic teachers.

Besides The Creed Explained, he has also written: The Commandments Explained, The Sacraments Explained, Leading the Little Ones to Christ, The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, A Method of Confession and Holy Communion, and a two-volume work, The Theory of Revelation!

Lost Credit

We have a lot of surprises in store for us on Judgment Day. One of them will be the sight of those gathered on the left of the throne. We're going to see "good" people there — people who seemed to be busy in all kinds of good works here on earth: philanthropists and professional men, artists, nurses, teachers, all sorts of "nice" people.

They were good — surely, except that they never happened to think of nodding their heads to God. There will be doctors there who treated lots of poor people for nothing; lawyers who defended paupers; composers who could write like angels; good neighbors who had a finger in every community project.

The catch is that their goodness was purely natural. We're naturally good in other words. It's no credit to us when we shudder on seeing the legless man swinging along the pavement on his stump. We may even drop a dime into his cap. That's natural. We do it not for the love of Christ, but simply because we would be monstrous if we didn't do it. If someone's hat blows off his head, we chase after it quite thoughtlessly — not as an act of charity, but as an act of natural friendliness. If someone trips, we rush to help him up and brush off his clothes — again through natural sympathy. That sort of kindness isn't entered in on the credit side of the books. Even an atheist would do as much.

We are Christians, and our actions count only to the degree in which we live for Christ — in the extent to which we lead the inner life, as it is called. The people among whom we move don't see this life. Outwardly, we're doing our work — keeping on earning our pay. Inwardly, we're worshiping Our Lord, united with Him constantly. Our alms are given reverently to Christ in the person of casual cripples or "moochers." It is His hat that we chase as it rolls gaily along the curbing. It is He Who trips and is helped to His feet, whose clothes we brush off. Then we are being supernaturally good. Then our actions are written in black ink on the right side of the book.

The trouble is it's easy to be fooled into thinking we're charitable, because we're naturally easily enough — by just making an internal dedication. Without it, they count for nothing.
