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

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When, on that first Christmas day, Mary laid her Divine Child in the manger and in the silence of that poor stable offered her prayer to God, she pointed the way to the Home Shrine. Accepting her guidance, Catholic mothers have erected little shrines in their homes, places for quiet prayer and meditation, places where families offer their joint prayer for God's guidance and blessing.

The Home Shrine takes many forms. Sometimes it is a crucifix, sometimes a holy picture or statue. It may be very simple or it may be surrounded by lights and flowers, but its purpose is always the same—to dedicate the family to God. In these war days when families are separated and loved ones in danger, the Home Shrine is a constant reminder of the union that exists through prayer.

Families gather together before the shrine to recite the Rosary for peace and for the welfare of those in the Service. Many times a mother pauses in her busy day to offer a little prayer that God and His Blessed Mother may protect her absent son. The Home Shrine is often varied with each month, honoring the particular saint of that month. Shrines are placed in gardens, on church lawns, in public places. At Christmas time, besides the Cribs in homes, many are placed in churchyards or community squares where carols are sung, and people join in religious celebration. Christmas Cribs are erected in military camps for the boys away from home.

Heads of the Home
The Home Shrine is an integral part of the Christian home, in fact, it symbolizes the center of the household, for a Christian home is one in which God dwells and the family live close to Him. The truly Catholic mother sits at the feet of Christ just as did Mary even though like Martha, she must be "busy about many things." These do not absorb her whole attention. She knows, and she teaches her little ones, that Christ must live in us. The Home Shrine is an aid to this "living close to God." It means the family—father, mother,
