Archbishop Spellman Endorses Plan To Fight Racial Disunity

NEW YORK.—The Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York, has endorsed the American Jewish Committee's four-point program to combat racial disunity in America. In a message to former Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, who read the program on a radio program, Archbishop Spellman said:

"I trust your noble efforts to be helpful in overcoming religious and racial animosities will bear fruit and will promote mutual respect, understanding and tolerance among all groups of Americans."

Following are the program's four points: 1. I will spread no rumor and no slander against any race. 2. I will never try to instill a whole people by reason of the delinquency of any member. 3. I will deal with every man in business, in social and in political relations, only on the basis of his true individual worth. 4. I will daily conduct myself according to self-honor hour by hour, to the achievement of the highest ideal of the dignity of mankind, human equality, human fellowship and human brotherhood."
