PVT. STELLA WRITES HOME

OWEGO.—Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Stella, of George St., have received an interesting letter from their younger son, Pvt. Robert Stella, who is stationed somewhere in Italy.

Pvt. Stella relates his experience when he received his first baptism of fire and how it effected him. He describes the wonderful sight of seeing the Allied planes, bombers and pursuit planes, in great number, flying overhead and of seeing them in combat with the enemy, many of the latter's planes being shot down. He writes of seeing the Germans and Allies' artillery firing at each other and of the terrific noise the bombardment made for miles around.

He is with two other soldiers

in charge of a radio station and Pvt. Stella is the cook for the trio. The food is good and very nourishing and the fellows seem quite contented. When the letter was written the soldiers were just beginning to receive their Christmas packages and mail.

Similar to the remarks made by other soldiers, Pvt. Stella says that what the soldiers want most is letters from home, for only those who are in real action can ever realize what it means to have mail arriving often.

SERGEANT DIES

Mr. and Mrs. Louis Panetti, who on New Year's Day received a telegram from the War Department stating that their son, Sgt. Mario Panetti, had been killed in an accident in England on Christmas Day, last week received a letter confirming this fact from the War Department. The letter stated that further information received from England stated that Sgt. Panetti had met his death in an airplane crash near Okehampton, Devon County, England, but further details of the accident were lacking.

Sgt. Panetti was the first graduate of St. Patrick's Parochial School to make the supreme sacrifice. Besides his parents he is survived by one sister, Caroline Panetti, and one brother, Patrick Panetti.
