He said in part: "The small things in the world which in themselves seem little and insignificant, but when united together have great strength and importance, such as a small snowflake, a raindrop, etc., which in themselves seem little, and yet when combined are responsible for great floods and the mighty seas. Man when compared to the great universe of the sun, the moon and the stars seems so little and insignificant and yet man plays the most important role of all in this great universe and his greatness is in his littleness."

"Science has perfected an instrument which can record the weight and influence that a small straw has when laid on a solid steel rail. In the naked eye nothing does not have any effect on the rail, but when recorded by the instrument mentioned, it has a bearing on the steel rail, the straw even as little and weightless as it may seem."

Father Haffey then told of an atom, which is the smallest particle of matter, which cannot even

be seen by the naked eye, and yet in that minute atom there exists a universe, as it were in itself, as small and insignificant as it may seem.
