

'Call Schools' If Old Paper Still Not Picked Up

Paper, Paper and still more Paper. The country can not get enough paper to fill wartime needs, to ship baled piano, food rations, shells, bombs, airplane parts, everything on the war essential list, overseas.

According to the Paper Salvage Committee, paper has now taken first place on the list of necessities of war. Deprived of help to cut down the forests for wood pulp, to hew the logs into cord wood and to work in the paper mills, the only salvation of the government in this paper crisis, is the salvaging of old paper.

This week children of the parochial and public schools are going from house to house, doing their patriotic bit to help the government fix its hour of need. Do

your share by having the paper ready for them.

There is no such thing, Donald Nelson, War Production Board Chairman, says as Waste Paper. Nowhere should paper be buried or otherwise wasted. Every scrap of it is needed. Especially valuable for remaking into paper containers are old paper or cardboard cartons such as dresses or rum are packed in. Corrugated paper is especially valuable material. Egg boxes, greeting cards, end records, calendars, even those dainty valentines, should go to Uncle Sam to help him win the war.

If the children have not as yet called for your paper, call the schools and they will see that it is collected, the committee states.

Conflict Between Holy See and Fascism Reviewed in New Book

MILWAUKEE — An answer to the recent attack of the Soviet newspaper *Izvestia*, accusing the Vatican of "pro-Fascism," is contained in a new book "White Smoke Over the Vatican," by Don Shirkay, editor of the Catholic Messenger, to be published here on March 16 by the Bruce Publishing Company.

Although the volume was in the hands of the printer prior to the *Izvestia* attack, one of the longest chapters, "Mussolini and the Pope," reviews the relations of Church and State in Italy since the advent of Fascism.

"The Church and Fascism were irreconcilably opposed," the author writes. "Fascism said that the State is supreme and that everything else is secondary. The Church says that God comes first and that the heads of the State are accountable to Him. Between these two schools of thought there can be no compromise."

During the entire life of the Fascist regime, the author points out, the Holy See was engaged in protests against Fascist persecution, a state of affairs that continued even after the negotiations leading up to the Lateran pacts.

Of these facts, the author writes: "In 1929, for reasons best known to himself Mussolini desired to reach an agreement with the Holy See. Some authorities said that his popularity with his own people had fallen so low that he sought to restore it and knew of no better way than the settling of the Roman Question." He restored a small fraction of the land that had been stolen from the Church 50 years before and agreed to a number of other provisions that were no more than just. Pope Pius XI was naturally pleased to take what was rightfully his. This in no way meant that he approved of Mussolini's government. He had had many struggles with Mussolini before; he was to have many more in the future."

Vatican Scratches Report of Bomb In Sistine Chapel

VATICAN CITY.—The report broadcast by radio that an unexploded time-bomb was found in the Sistine Chapel Thursday, Feb. 27, is declared by Vatican officials to be without foundation.

500 Divorce Cases Monthly in Cuba

HAVANA.—Cuban courts are handling an average of 500 divorce cases monthly, the Rev. Ignacio Blain says in an article on the family crisis published in El Semanario Católico.

In 1941, Father Blain says, there were 1,089 divorces in Havana and 1,634 elsewhere in Cuba; in 1942 the figures had increased to 1,317 and 1,300 respectively, and in 1943 from Jan. 7 to Aug. 2 there were 1,042 divorces in the Capital and 1,619 elsewhere. "In only 22 days," he says, "six Havana juntas dissolved 300 marriages, 210 of them for cause incompatibility."
