

## Prosperity Follows Population Increase, Dr. Cronin Assures

**WASHINGTON, D. C.** — "The home, happy with the laughter of children, is the only true symbol of American prosperity, and declining birth rates will lead to economic chaos." *Prosperity and Population*

Speaking on the family as the national unit of economic security, at the Catholic Family Life Conference, the Rev. Dr. John F. Cronin, of St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, linked an expanding population to economic security and

stated: "To the extent that a rising standard of living is coupled to such growth in numbers, the expansive effect is multiplied. If, on the contrary, population declines, then production likewise suffers."

Father Cronin, speaking of the family limitation, he said, are fostering "a vicious circle of contracted production and employment which might spell economic and political ruin."

"Our present economy," he said, "is predicted upon the ideal of mass production and mass consumption... Economic expansion is had most normally when popu-

"Thus, the Catholic Church," he concluded, "in urging the law of God in regard to marriage, may be bringing to mankind a new era of domestic peace and tranquility, based upon the solid foundations of the Christian home. The ancient blessing of the patriarchs may again have meaning. Instead of the suicidal spiral toward race destruction and economic chaos, the earth and the fullness thereof will once again be shared among the children of men."

## Priest From Here Sees 'FDR' At Teheran Meeting

When President Roosevelt reviewed American troops during his recent visit to Teheran, the heart of at least one citizen of New York State jumped with pride.

The Rev. Emmett Murphy, priest of the Diocese of Rochester, and presently serving as an army chaplain with American forces in the Middle East, reports that he was at Teheran when the "Big Three" met there for their historic conference.

"The week that the 'Big Three' were here," writes Father Murphy, "was filled with all kinds of excitement. 'Actually, I only got in for the review which the President made. He rode his jeep up and down before the soldiers and then made a five-minute speech.'

"It was the first time I had seen him since he was Governor of New York State."

"Several of my friends were in on all the sessions—stenographers, but they are very mum about the proceedings." Father Murphy holds the rank of captain.

## NAZARETH OFFER ENDS APRIL 1st

The five Nazareth College Deans established in 1941 for a period of four years in connection with the campaign for the Greater Nazareth College, are offered for the last time this year to Catholic students in each of the five Deaneries of the Rochester Diocese. They are full tuition scholarships, valued at \$300 a year for four years, or \$1,200.

A Deanship Scholarship will be awarded to the student in each Deanship having the highest average standing in the Regents examinations through January, 1944, in the following fields: English, History, Mathematics, Modern Language, Latin, Science. Requests for Deanship Scholarship application blanks should be addressed to the Office of the Dean, Nazareth College, Rochester 10, New York. The completed blank should be accompanied by a recommendation from the Pastor of the applicant and of the principal of her high school, as to character, ability, maturity, and general fitness to pursue a college course. She must have earned on graduating a College Entrance certificate or sixteen units of academic credit required by Nazareth College for entrance. These entrance requirements vary somewhat according to the course in which the student wishes to matriculate. They will be found in our bulletin, a copy of which will be sent on request.

Applications should be sent not later than April 1.

## Portends White Race's Doom by Degradation Of Christian Home

**WINDSOR, Ont.** — The "empty cradle" foregoes the doom of the white race.

"When Christ raised marriage to the status of a Sacrament, there followed the morality of the Christian home, the highest this world has ever known," observed the Very Rev. Frank R. Wood, Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Whittington, in his radio address on the Trans-Canada Catholic Hour.

Father Wood pointed out that prior to the advent of Christianity, home life was virtually non-existent and the status of woman was one of degradation. The granting of divorce, he said, is tending in this direction, and giving rise not only to the evils of "localized orphans," the children of broken homes, but to birth prevention and the empty cradle.

"If indeed, it is not too late," Father Wood observed, "the falling birthrate of the white race, particularly of the Anglo-Saxon race, must be checked. Otherwise, we shall ultimately meet the fate of Greece and Rome. One does not have to be an expert mathematician to see that. I have spoken so long on this aspect of married life because it is one whose effects will be felt, and felt grievously, by generations yet unborn; and, whether we like it or not, it is ultimately going to change the course of history and the face of the world."

The Church of Christ," Father Wood concluded, "puts its mark forever upon the union of man and wife, in invoking the blessing of Almighty God upon that symbolic golden band, which is placed upon the finger of the bride by him who promises to be ever true and faithful to her and to the cause for which they have both thrown in their lot: the cause of posterity yet unborn; of mutual trust and fidelity, yet untried; of love not yet tempered by the lapse of time; the cause of all that is worth while in life; my friends, the love of a man and a maid, two souls, henceforth to be united, to have and to hold; and never to be put asunder, 'from this day forward, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, unto DEATH.'

## Prayer For Vocations

**LAFAYETTE, La.** — "I need only remind you that we had no one for ordination last year; we have none for this year," the Most Rev. Jules B. Jeannard, Bishop of Lafayette, reminded in his Lenten pastoral anniversary announcing a novena for vocations. "If God in his great goodness and mercy had not spared the lives of our priests in the ranks, we would be in a desperate plight," he said. "Our Lord tells us, in no uncertain terms, that we must pray if we want God to send us more into His vineyard."

## Hearst Answers 'Gangster Press' Of Soviet Regime

Attacks against Mr. William Randolph Hearst by Moscow's government controlled newspaper Pravda were answered by the American publisher in his Sunday New York Journal-American.

"Marshal Stalin in his controlled press, calls me a gangster journalist and a friend of Hitler's," Mr. Hearst wrote. "These accusations have their amusing side, coming from a gentleman who is the head of the Communist press—the only gangster press I know. And who was the closest and dearest friend Hitler had until that traitorous ally betrayed him and threw him over and refused any longer to divide the spoils of war with his eager partner?"

### Criticizes Soviet Press

Defending his assertion that the Soviet press was a "gangster press," Mr. Hearst asked:

"Does not the Communist press continually and consistently advocate the Communist principles of defiance of law and order, of the violent overthrow of established government, of the extinction in blood and brutality of the well-to-do classes?"

Referring to his charge that Stalin was a friend of Hitler, he demanded:

"Was not the estimable Marshal Stalin, until recently Hitler's best beloved friend and buddy, his accomplice in the invasion of the Baltic republics, his pal in the rape of Finland, his partner in the plunder of Poland?"

"Is not the general Marchi—although assuming an air of superiority and probity since his break with his pal Hitler—still trying to steal Finland and absorb the Baltic republics and re-avenge Poland?"

"A leopard does not change his spots, although deserted by his former hunting companion and dearest friend."
