OTTAWA—“Let us remember that the seeds of another war can be sown at a peace conference and let us accordingly resolve not to forget God at the Peace Table,” the Ottawa Journal, secular newspaper, says in an editorial.

“Many times during the course of the war when our fortunes were at a low ebb and our hopes were all but gone, we called upon God for strength and guidance,” the editorial says. “We looked for aid at Dunkirk, when it seemed that not even a miracle could save hundreds of thousands of our soldiers, and again in the dark days which followed when the military strength standing between Hitler and the conquest of Britain was negligible.

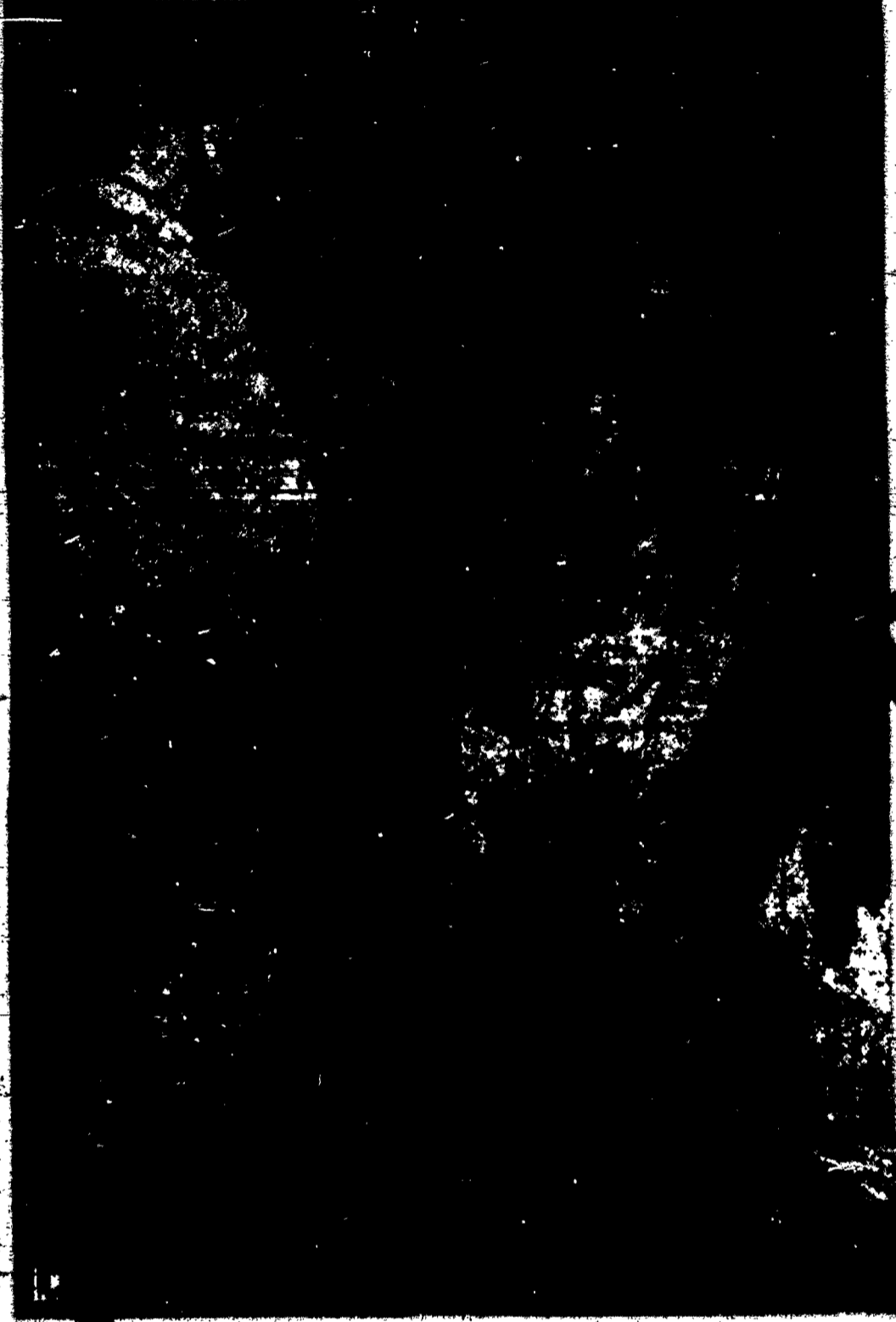

Nazis Carry On In Destroying Poland Churches

LONDON. (NC)—Reports of additional destruction of churches and church property in Poland by the German invaders have been received here, according to K.A.P. Polish Catholic Press Agency.

The reports stated that in Bydgoszcz, the large Catholic Church which stood in the market place, has been demolished. In Wloclaw, the Bishop's residence has been spoiled, plundered and converted into a Gestapo training school. Like the Cathedral, one of the largest and most beautiful in Poland, has been looted of everything movable.

The reports said that the heavily guarded confessionals and bells were burned in the fireplaces of the local sugar refinery that the Cathedral was used for three years as a military garage before it was closed and the diocesan archives, library and sanctuary records were burned.

The library, it was said, consisted of 50,000 volumes, many old prints and valuable records. The reports also said that the parish church in Tuchola has been demolished.

German authorities published a new law three months ago, it was reported, which provided that all church property in Silesia be confiscated. Nuns engaged in parish work in Poland, it was said, have been forced to register at labor exchanges and have been assigned to aid Germans evacuated from bombed German cities.

Report On Churches Damaged In Italy

LONDON. (NC)—A report of damage to Italian Cathedrals and churches and other artistic and historic monuments during the fighting in Italy is contained in a recent report of the British War Office.

The Cathedral of Benevento is stated to have been destroyed, and also the Archbishop's palace at Avellino. In Naples six churches have been destroyed and 15 severely damaged. Among those totally lost is the Church of Santa Chiara, the finest Gothic church in the city. The Cathedral of Capua is gone, the report states, and also a large part of the eleventh-century church of Sant'Angelo at Forlì.

Damage was inflicted on recent-erected ruins at Pompeii, but it was stated that work is proceeding to rebuild and make water-tight the ancient, damaged ruins. The report also is reported to contain details of fighting for the city of Salerno, in its

Enshrining Peace Ideals Citadels of Learning Must Stand Avers Dr. Mahoney

BROOKLYN—“A war is never won with the destruction of the ideals of peace, and these ideals are enshrined in our citadels of learning,” observed the Very Rev. Dr. William J. Mahoney, C.M., president of St. John's University here, addressing 300 members of the alumni and their guests at the 63rd annual dinner of the Alumni Association.

Dr. Mahoney before taking the presidency of St. John's was Dean of the College of Business Administration, Niagara University at Niagara Falls and in Rochester.

Commenting on the action of the Government in discontinuing the Army Special Training Program, Dr. Mahoney observed that when a father is drafted into the army, provision is made to keep the family and home intact and so likewise, he said, “some provision should be made to keep open the colleges for those students when they return from the Armed Forces.”

“Liberal Arts have suffered an eclipse in prestige and importance in these days of technological warfare,” Dr. Mahoney continued. “The needs of the Armed Forces and defense industries have placed unusual emphasis upon technical and vocational education. It is unfortunate, so it was unfortunate,

But it would be more telling misfortune not to restore the Liberal Arts to the college and the college to the Liberal Arts. And in this restoration stress must be placed upon the intrinsic and terminal values of these studies rather than as means to professional ends.

“The Liberal Arts curriculum trains the mind to disengage itself from selfish interests and to see problems in their social perspectives. It fosters those all-necessary social virtues of Christian justice and charity. Such development of men in social-mindedness, or better, God-mindedness, will be indispensable when war-wearing world sets about the task of rebuilding the ruins of a Christian civilization.”

Soviets First To Aid Fascists and Nazis

MEXICO CITY—Recent Soviet attempts to represent the Pope as servile to Fascism are in the category of lies and calumny, stated an editorial in *Ultimas Noticias*, daily newspaper of the Mexican capital.

Comparing the record of Soviet Russia and Fascist Rome with that of Pope Pius XII, the editorial recalls that the Soviet representative at Rome was “the first diplomat to give a reception for Mussolini when he was tottering after the Matteotti assassination”; that Molotov and von Ribbentrop had a “gentlemen's agreement” when “Poland was pulverized and partitioned,” and that “the oil that helped to make pap out of the Abyssinians was shipped from Baku, thanks to the magnificent relations existing between Moscow and Rome—the Fascist Rome—from 1922 up to June 22, 1941.”

Brotherhood Movement Denounced As Godless Substitute for Religion

NEW YORK (NC)—Scorning the Brotherhood Movement as “a godless substitute for religion,” the Most Rev. J. Francis McIntyre, Auxiliary Bishop and Chancellor of New York, addressing a Knights of Columbus at the Hotel Astor, declared that “brotherhood” activities in our camps have been “reprehensible because under the guise of what it is not, the movement has sponsored what are godless religious services and so arranged matters that the men were practically forced to attend in some instances.”

“This ‘brotherhood’ declares itself to be not religious,” the Bishop said. “It refuses to participate openly with religious groups in matters of religion, yet it insists upon holding ‘round table’ talks at which it wishes present representatives of the ‘three faiths.’ The ‘brotherhood’ is, therefore, not legitimate, but, rather, illegitimate because it advocates a so-called ‘brotherhood’ but neglects the Fatherhood of God. That makes the concept illegitimate.

“The idea of the brotherhood of man, when properly conceived, understood and practiced is, of course, a noble idea, because it is based on the Fatherhood of God and the love of neighbor for the love of God.”

“The movement has had a splendid opportunity to demonstrate what would seem to be its scope in the release of this program for religious instruction of school children,” Bishop McIntyre said. “Statesmen, educators and leaders of thought have concurred in the opinion that religious instruction to the youth of our day is the real remedy for many social disorders. The program has been most successful where it has been tried. Yet, this ‘brotherhood’ movement has refused to sponsor or participate in or encourage this program, falling back on the horn of the dilemma it presents: it is not religious.”

Warns of Paganism Seeking To Make God of Government

SYRACUSE. (NC)—A “fresh form of paganism is running a large in America,” which has government for its god and neopagan worshippers who “would render to Caesar the whole gamut of human life,” Clarence Manion, dean of the college of law at the University of Notre Dame, declared in an address before the Catholic Women's Club of Syracuse.

“Their god may not have made the world in the first place but he is out to remake it now—and with a vengeance,” said Dean Manion. He asserted that “of course this new state will be a ‘Democracy’ which assurance is expected to compensate the follower for the loss of his soul.” He declared that “the decrees of ‘The Great God Government’ must take precedence over constitutional bills of rights as well as the Ten Commandments, and that its noteworthy feature is the unchallenged progress it has made ‘with what passes as the intellectual leadership of our country.’”

“At the very hour when we are embroiled in a destructive life or death world war against the Nazi brand of paganism,” said Mr. Manion, “the moral builders on the home front are busy telling us that the same rose by a different name will have another odor.” Who-soever dares to publicize the treasonable nature of their despotic freedom-destroying creed is immediately called a Fascist reactionary.

Mr. Manion said there is one sure way to call the hand of the government worshippers and “that is by revival of faith in the first and greatest Commandment of the One True God.”

Missing Redemptorist Chaplain's Return Answers Prayers of 15,000

NEW ORLEANS—The day after approximately 15,000 persons prayed in the two churches and the chapel of the Redemptorist Parish for the safety of Chaplain Harry F. Wade, C.S.S.R., he returned uninjured to his military flight patrol in the Southwest Pacific.

Chaplain Wade, who has the rank of captain, was reported by the War Department as missing, as of Feb. 7. In addition to the prayers offered by relatives, the Redemptorists, and other friends, prayers were offered Sunday, Feb. 13, in the Redemptorist churches.

The message received by one of Chaplain Wade's sisters was: “We are pleased to inform you that your brother, Captain Wade, who has been previously reported missing in flight, returned safely and un-

injured to the military flight patrol on Feb. 14.”

Distribute Nipples

Rubber nursing nipples numbering 25,000 were distributed to the babies of North Africa by the American Red Cross in 1943.
