

## DO'S and DON'TS

*. . . Useful Hints for Better Service From Your Electrical Appliances!*



### DO

HANDLE WITH CARE. Until their manufacture is renewed on a large scale, appliances may be difficult to replace. So, until then, use them regularly to insure their faithful performance, but be careful not to drop or break them.

### DON'T

OVERHEAT. If your automatic master overheat, it indicates that the heat control needs adjustment. Take it to your electrical dealer. Sometimes parts are out of stock, but most appliances can be repaired satisfactorily within a reasonably short time nowadays.



### DO

KEEP IN USE. You need your home-living household appliances more than ever these days. Protect cords from twisting, breaking or pulling out. When disconnecting, grasp the plug firmly—not the cord. For repairs, see your electrical appliance dealer.

### DON'T

HANDLE WITH WET HANDS. Avoid short circuits. Always disconnect when cleaning. Don't place electrical appliances in water. Remove crumbs from toaster frequently. Don't shake to remove dirt or crumbs bad for heating element.

## Abets Soviet Attack, On Polish Government

LONDON — Prime Minister Winston Churchill's recent pledge that Britain will go "all the way with Russia," prompted and encouraged Soviet Russia's latest abusive attack on the Polish Government, it intimated by "The Universe," Catholic weekly of London.

The London paper contends that whether or not the Polish Government meets Russian demands for dismissal of its commander-in-chief and alterations in the Cabinet, it would make little difference since Russia's claims on Polish territory are "fixed and negotiable."

"The Universe" states:

"The Soviet Government, judging rightly that all that mattered in Mr. Churchill's speech was his declaration that we shall go 'all the way with Russia,' has, of course, rejected the Polish proposal, indulged in a new abusive attack on the Polish Government, demanded the dismissal of the Commander-in-Chief and alterations in the Cabinet. If all this is done it will make no difference. Russia's claims are fixed and unalterable. The Poles, if it is proposed, may recompense themselves for the theft of their territory by stealing Germany's. This latter proposal has outraged correspondents of 'The Times,' who consider the dismemberment of a small ally quite natural but the same process applied to a large country immoral. Meanwhile the editor of the 'Nineteenth Century' pertinently reminds us that if we break our

word to Poland, for whom we started the war, it will become retroactively an unjust war. These things are being said by non-Catholics. Catholics can hardly be expected to say or to feel less."

"When a war ceases to be struggle for survival it can be justified—if it can cease to be justifiable—if it is in a just cause. The people of this country were told in 1939 that we were fighting to establish an international order in which the Pope's point could be realized and the life of large nations would not mean the death of small ones. The mental confusion of our realists is as evident as the moral. In one breath we are told that Germany is to be made incapable of renewed aggression and in the next that Europe must be carried up on the assumption that such aggression is a continuing danger. Poland, Finland and the Baltic States are to be sacrificed to protect the strongest Power in Europe from a disarmed and dismembered Germany."

## Msgr. O'Toole Dies in Capital

WASHINGTON — The Rev. Msgr. G. Barry O'Toole, Professor of Philosophy at the Catholic University of America and co-founder of the Catholic University of Peking, China, here, died unexpectedly of a heart attack in his room at the university on Sunday, March 26. He was in his fifty-eighth year.

### STRUGGLE UP HILL FROM MT. OLIVET

JESUS knelt in agony on the Mount of Olives. Then He struggled up the hill to Calvary. Surely a priest trained in the little Syrian Seminary on the Mount of Olives has many memories to make him a zealous apostle, even a martyr.

Father Malke is frank enough about his poor Seminary at Charlie. It seems that his students do know something of the struggle up the hill from the Mount of Olives.

### BETRAYAL
