Urges Registration For War Work Training

Four-F's, men 18 to 45 and others who face probable alternatives of taking essential jobs or being inducted into Army labor battalions were urged by Verne A. Bird, Assistant Superintendent of Schools and Director of Vocational Training for War Production to begin registration for immediate job training at anyone of seven high schools operating war training for war production courses in Rochester.

Bird pointed out these men who will be affected by the proposed legislation in Washington can be assigned to paid training classes if they can qualify and will be trained as skilled workers to fill existing war plant vacancies. Some men who are now employed in non-essential industries can register for evening school training and continue working until they have been graduated from training classes as skilled and assigned to essential work while others could register and be immediately assigned to plants operating "in-plant" training in conjunction with the Board of Education Vocational War Training Program, he said.

Registrations will be accepted beginning Tuesday morning in Room 108 at the Board of Education or at anyone of the high schools operating under the program of Vocational Training for War Production.
